COMMITTEE REPORTS

Trails: It was brought up that a trough should be put at the bottom of the hill at Sierra Azul. Jennifer was looking into this with the parks committee. Jennifer has been looking into the possibility of a new trail linking trails in Calero to Quicksilver and Sierra Azul (Casa Loma Road). We could possibly use this as a base camp for poker rides. It was also suggested that we bring trail maps to each meeting as to better understand which trails would be connected, etc.

Spring Ride: The earliest date for a spring ride would be May, and this is only if we started planning and authorizing details now. Jennifer proposed that we do a poker ride if the spring ride doesn't happen, as there are a ton of endurance rides in and around May. She volunteered to run the ride and have it at Casa Loma (possibly?). Maryben has extra awards for prizes, and Karen is in the process of making blankets for juniors, etc. It was proposed that we bring a calendar to each of the meetings to coordinate and decide open dates for a possible ride.

New Business: 1) We passed around a sheet of paper sent from Lori that proposed a possible process of coming up with awards for a sequence of rides in our region. We did not get into this sheet in detail, and should probably have a discussion about it. The club agreed to continue talking about an award for doing a series of rides connected to the club. 2) Jennifer brought up the upcoming Trail Masters Course, which is going to be run by Robert Ribley and Nick Warhol. This course allows you to become certified to build trails and lead parties in both repairing and discovering new trails. The possibility of hosting a course like this in our area was brought up. We just need to get enough people interested. 3) Dick talked about connecting Harvey Bear to Coe and how it is in the future. There is very good camping space in Harvery Bear, and the park plans on putting in more water in the future at both sites. This will be a great place for a ride, as both parks have an extensive amount of trails and good camping if they were connected. 4) Concerning the banquet, we talked about the need for a microphone in announcing awards, etc. We should see if anyone in the club has one we could borrow. Also, Dick wanted to know if there was a set committee working on the Hall of Fame and Eleanor Norton awards, etc. The club wanted to make sure this was being taken care of. Dick proposed that passed down awards (example, weight division) have the name of the winner put on them. This way, there would be a sense of history when receiving the award. We would have to get an awards committee to get this done.

MURPHY'S HORSE / BARN LAWS

- 1. If you do a thorough check of your trailer before hauling, your truck will break down.
- 1a. And your cell phone will not work. Or, your 'auto/truck plan' will not cover expenses, and you are exactly half way between home and destination. And you left your major credit card at home! Of course, all contacts for 'help' are 'stored' in your cell phone contacts list. No service.
- 1b. Most 'major' home / barn 'problems' will occur when you are away at a Ride. I.E., the well pump fails, the furnace quits. 'Oldie' gets a "bellyache." Your Mother, Spouse, In-Laws, neighbor calls, while you are 'on the road' and wants to know "What to Do!?"
- 2. There is no such thing as a sterile barn cat.
- 2a. If you manage to catch and inoculate, spay/neater 'a stray.' something "will 'happen' to it." Or, it will become a housecat. Guaranteed. (Same applies to dogs)
- 2b. Once you feed a 'stray' it is yours.
- 3. No one ever notices how you ride until you fall off.
- 3a. You will not 'fall off,' 'be bucked off,' 'unseated' unless someone is there watching. If, only they could have seen your 'great skill' (luck) in riding Ole Killers' bucks / shys / "flights of fancy", "airs above ground" before.
- 4. The least useful horse in your barn will eat the most, require shoes every four weeks and will need the vet at least once a month.
- 4a. Sell him, forget it !!, you can not even give him away.!! (See above 3a, 5, 6, and 21.)
- 5. A horse's misbehavior will be in direct proportion to the number of people who are watching. Especially, if the horse is for sale!
- 6. Tack you hate never wears out; blankets you hate cannot be destroyed; horses you hate cannot be sold and will outlive you.
- 6a. Mice and mold will only attack useful, and liked articles. 6b. Horses you never ride, are never lame, or sick.
- 7. Clipper blades will become dull only when the horse is half-finished. Clipper motors will quit only when you have the horse's head left to trim.
- 8. If you're wondering if you left the water on in the barn, you did. If you're wondering if you latched the pasture gate, you didn't.
- 9. One horse isn't enough; two is too many.
- 10. If you approach within 50 feet of the barn in your "street clothes," you will get dirty. (You do not own any white clothing.)

HORSE COOKIE RECIPES

Easy Horse Cookies

2 cups dry oatmeal 3/4 cup grain 3 cups bran 1 cup molasses

Mix oats, grain and bran together in a bucket. Drizzle in molasses while mixing with your hands. Place handfulls on a cookie sheet and bake at 375° for 8 minutes.

Electrolyte Cookies

- 2 cups oats (I use crimped oats or barley/mix)
- 3/4 cup grain (I use either LMF or barley)
- 3 cups bran
- 1 cup molasses
- 1 cup water (may vary depending upon altitude)
- 12-24 1-oz. scoops of powdered electrolytes (depends how strong you want them)

Mix all the ingredients together. You should have a consistency a little thinner than play-doh. If it isn't wet or sticky enough, add a little more water or molasses. Place large spoonfuls on a (greased) cookie sheet. Bake at 325 for 30-40 minutes. These have a tendency to burn so keep an eye on them.

Cob Cookies

- 8 cups dry cob feed (corn.oats. barlev mix)
- 3 cups ground carrots
- 1/2 cup corn oil
- 2 cups flour
- 2 cups molasses (use livestock grade from feed store - it's cheaper!)

Mix all ingredients together in a large bowl until well mixed. Let stand for at least an hour (so the grain can absorb some of the moisture). Stir the mixture well. Drop by rounded teaspoonful on to a well oiled cookie sheet. Using your fingers and the teaspoon 'smoosh' the cookie into a round slightly flattened shape. Bake at 350 degrees for 12 to 18 minutes, depending on your oven. These will burn easily so be sure not to leave them in too long. Put the cookies on racks to cool then store them in a tight container. Makes between 6-9 dozen.
