QUICKSILVER ENDURANCE RIDERS **GENERAL MEETING MINUTES**

January 17, 2007

In attendance: Sandy Holder, Maryben Stover, Marvin Snowbarger, Margaret Graham, Kathy Brayton, Darran Ross, Kathy Schmidt, Bing Voight, Jennifer Voight, Trilby Peterson, Ildi Nasdasdy, Steve Lenheim

The minutes from the last meeting were read and approved.

Treasurer's Report: Trilby presented the Treasurer's report.

> General Account: \$6,433.26 Trails Account: \$1,016.56 Junior Account: \$782.02

Trilby initiated a discussion of discarding old banks records and proposed to keep records going back four years, a generally accepted accounting practice. Members debated the merits of keeping old records and keeping records four years past. Bing made a motion to accept Trilby's recommendation, Jennifer seconded the motion and it was carried by unanimous voice vote.

Trails: Judy Etheridge contacted Sandy Holder in connection with opportunities for QSER to support and have input into ongoing trail issues. The Open Space Authority (OSA) is considering improvements in the Alum Rock/Sierra Road staging area. A discussion of various trail concerns and opportunities ensued. Sandy made a motion to appoint Judy Etheridge the QSER representative to the OSA Trails Council and the East Bay Trails Council and to appoint Jennifer Voight the QSER representative to Santa Clara County Parks and the Mid Peninsula Open Space Authority. Both were approved by unanimous voice vote.

Awards Banquet: The QSER awards banquet is on Saturday, February 10 at Harry's Hofbrau House in Saratoga at 6pm. There is no General Meeting in Februrary. Steve Lenheim and Maryben Stover are in the process of finalizing awards and the calendar.

Spring Ride/Fall Ride: Discussion of a QSER spring ride continued from the last meeting. Doug Reynaud is unwilling to allow QSER to use his pasture as a staging area, so Henry Coe Park is not an option for the foreseeable future. The proposed date of the spring ride, May 12, conflicts with other club rides (SASO). Options for holding the spring ride in other parks ensued. A suggestion was made to consider holding the ride in the fall so as to avoid scheduling and logistical conflicts. Steve Lenheim volunteered to be ride manager for a Fall QSER ride at Grant Ranch County Park. Assistant ride managers also volunteered to help Steve: Darran Ross, Margaret Graham, Kathy Brayton, Bing Voight and Kathy Schmidt. A motion was made to abandon the spring QSER ride in favor of a fall QSER ride on October 6 at Grant Ranch and was approved by unanimous voice vote.

New Business: Marvin proposed that we include a list of all QSER meetings in the newsletter for planning purposes. A motion to adopt Marvin's proposal was approved by unanimous voice vote. A proposal was made by Sandy to have an informal monthly QSER ride locally for fun and socializing. She proposed that this be included in a new section of the newsletter called Monthly Spirit. IN MEMORY OF RAZZMAN

March 2, 1990 to July 19, 2006

What makes a wonderful endurance horse memorable? For Razz it was his personality quirks and his willingness to trot mile after mile. At some point in his youth he must have been thoroughly frightened by something behind him. He would suddenly bolt forward for no apparent reason, at least not apparent to his human partners. He did this while tied to the trailer, on the trail or when being shod. He also had the habit of pushing against the bit or hackamore, always wanting to go faster, to catch the horse ahead and pass. Bob once told me he could tell it was Razz & I miles out from camp by the way Razz tossed his head.

In spite of his guirks, he completed 5825 miles of endurance rides, including two Tevis finishes, one the same year that he completed the 20 Mule Team 100 and Swanton Pacific 100. He also completed many multi-day rides. The longest being the 2001 XP ride from Missouri to Nevada where Razz was ridden 850 miles out of the 2,000 miles total. In 2004 he completed 600 miles of the 1200-mile XP ride going from California to Nebraska. On the 2004 ride he tied for first place several times and received three best conditions. During his early endurance career Razz was ridden by Julie and Bob Suhr, with Julie completing Tevis and Swanton Pacific in 2000. Their daughter Barbara White also competed on Razz. Nancy Twight rode him to his first Tevis completion in 1999. Our daughter Christy says that Razz carried her through the 2000 20 Mule Team ride. They managed to get written up in Sports Illustrated for being the final competitors finishing all alone around 3:00 a.m. It was Christy's first and only 100-mile ride. Bob and I enjoyed many multi-day rides on Razz. Bob felt a special bond with Razz and Razz always knew that Bob was good for a soothing scratch around the ears. Razz carried us over hill and desert, through sleet, rain, snow and 100+ degree sunshine. He was one awesome horse and his memory will live long in our hearts. - Bob and Pat Verheul

TEVIS TRAIL RIDING FOR ALL

I am currently reading Hal Hall's latest edition of The Western States Trail Guide, A comprehensive guide to the 100 miles of trail between Squaw Valley and Auburn, California. Printed in 2006, this guide gives the latest historical findings, as well as descriptions of recent changes in the routes for the Western States 100 Miles One Day Ride (The Tevis Cup Ride) and the Western States Endurance Run. Additionally, the guide gives practical information such as driving directions to trail heads, estimated riding time between locations, and maps.

I find the historical information to be very pleasurable reading. Many Quicksilver Club members have had the privilege and joy of completing the Ride, the Run, or both events. Event day, with its adrenaline rush, focused goal, and constant attention to physical and mental status of both horse and human, allows little time for historical or geological reflection as one traverses the amazing route. However, curling up with Hal's book on a winter's evening by the fire is a fine way of indulging oneself in learning more about this special trail.

Perhaps some of you have longed to see the trail but have, for whatever reason, been unable to enter the 100 Mile Ride. Perhaps you have wanted to travel portions of it on another day but have been a bit fearful of striking out on your own. Or maybe you have completed the Ride and/or Run but would like to go back and enjoy it at a slower place, taking the time to marvel at the views, listen for the wildlife, and smell, well, not the roses, but there is plenty of other foliage growing out there.

An exciting new event is planned this year that might be of interest to many of you, the first Western States Two Day Educational Ride. At a slower pace and with experienced guides, this ride is open to anyone with a horse fit to travel 30-35 miles in one day, and it will cover the trail from Robinson Flat to Auburn. Riders will leave in groups from Robinson Flat and travel to Foresthill on the first day, June 30th. After camping out, they will depart the next day, July 1st, for Auburn. Current word has it that the river will be lowered that day for safe crossing. To add to the fun there will be a catered barbecue, various speakers, and other activities to make this weekend entertaining and memorable.

Full information and entry forms will be available at the AERC Convention and on the Tevis web site. The traditional Fun Ride will be held in May, and the big event, of course, will be on July 28th. Three different organized opportunities are offered for anyone who wishes to understand what the Tevis magic is all about. And, if you desire, you can pick up a copy of Hal's latest edition at the Convention as well. Proceeds benefit the Foundation.



HORSES AND WEEDS

The AERC recently funded research to answer the question, "Are horses responsible for introducing non-native plants along trails in the eastern United States?" This research was led by Dr. Stith T. Gower at the University of Wisconsin. In the final report of December 28, 2006, it is concluded that, based on their research, "these data suggest that horses are not an important source for the introduction of non-native plants."

Many of you are aware of EnviroHorse, Adda Quinn, and her passionate support for trails. Her work here in California has great potential to impact, and one would hope, benefit all trail riders. Below is a posting from her, with a request to contact her if you would like to know more or are able to support her work. Currently, horse trails are being lost at an alarming rate for many different reasons. Without scientific evidence, horses are frequently accused of transporting non-native plants and seeds into an area. Efforts to find the scientific truth of the matter are very important.

As you know, I have been working on environmental issues pertaining to horses for some years now. Horses and weed spreading have been an issue for some time now. AERC recently funded research at the Univ of WIsc to do a study. You can view the results at: www.gser.net/07 AERC Final Rpt.pdf To my knowledge, this has not as yet been peer reviewed nor

published in peer-reviewed literature (which is vital), but hopefully it will be in 2007. The AERC findings are very important and should be the subject of newsletter articles for those of you with newsletters.

I am involved in the Dominican University study referenced in this attachment. Federal government agencies funded this work in excess of \$100,000. We are editing the field house findings now to submit to a peer review journal. The Dominican study had two phases. NO PLANT ON THE CALIFOR-NIA DEPT OF AGRICULTURE WEED LIST WAS FOUND IN EITHER PHASE. CDF is the regulatory body that certifies CWFF. However some of the phase 2 plants that grew are on the Cal IPC list in either moderate or limited categories.

Dominican also plans to submit to peer review a literature review which essentially concludes that while some weeds do grow in greenhouse (ideal) settings, few of these plants are found along trails. It calls for more studies at the landscape level, such as the one funded by AERC attached.

My thanks to those of you who have funded EnviroHorse (particularly to the Kvamme and Ebson Family Foundations, and individual members of the Mounted Patrol of San Mateo County) who enabled us to make the \$16,000 donation to Dominican that bought us a seat at the table to be able to extend the study to Phase 2 and to participate in the editing process of the Dominican work. We have had major impact on the development of both papers. Further research will be undertaken, likely at Dominican U where EnviroHorse has established a positive relationship with researchers.

If you are interested in the results of the Dominican studies, please send me an email so that I can send to you when they are available for distribution/publication. If you think horsemen should have a seat at the table in future research you must be willing to fund it as EnviroHorse is now out of money. Please send contributions made out to the Marin Horse Council to me Adda Quinn 3027 St. James Rd Belmont CA 94002. Marin Horse Council is 501c3 and deductible. This subject is not going to go away until there are numerous articles supporting the same conclusions in peer reviewed literature.

The AERC paper is a good way to begin the new year!
