Report from My New Home

As a new resident of Marin County, I offer my gratitude to all who were involved in this. To make this a bit more personal, my new home is about 50 yards from the Indian Valley Open Space. My family and I are out there every chance we get, riding, running, dog walking or stroller pushing.

Today, Djubilee and I started on a fire road with access for all: horses, hikers, runners, cyclists and dogs off leash. There is a lot of use and activity on the fire road, which is wide and relatively flat. There are, also, a number of trails off of the fire road, where I find almost daily peace and happiness. Bikes are forbidden, and dogs are supposed to be on leash. These are climbing, single track, technical trails, with the early wildflowers, small waterfalls, and beautiful vistas in every direction. I see a few hikers and runners, and, rarely, a renegade biker. Most of the dogs are off leash, but quickly gathered up when their owners see me approach. All of the humans I encounter are in the state of bliss one finds out in nature and away from the madding crowd. Far be it from me to complain about a dog off leash; I get it. I would hate to lose access to these trails. Their use is minimal and appropriate for horses.

There are also trails where horses are forbidden. I mistakenly rode one with my daughter once, when we first moved in, not seeing the sign. It was our mistake, as I kept saying to her as we traversed a steep trail with exposed roots underneath and limbs at eye level, "I can't believe people ride horses on this."

So, based on my experience, the trails close to me are appropriate in terms of signage and use. I feel very fortunate that this issue has been settled for now, and I thank everyone who had a part in it.

2016 Was a Roller Coaster of a Year

The good:

Q's first 100-miler at **20 Mule Team** (fabulous vets, Ride Management, riders, volunteers) where we met great new friends and finished strong, albeit a slightly sore back initially due to broken billets, much better after he rolled.

Cuyama – 2 days with Bolt doing back-to-back 25's and while 'almost losing his mind', finished strong both days Cooley Ranch – boy what a 'learning experience' on 2 very hot days. Day 1 – we were pulled at the finish after standing in the sun for 10 minutes in 96 degree heat with 70%+ humidity (64 HR when the pulse had been lowered to 60, and no water at the finish line vet area)...so my "metabolic pulled horse" was at 60 after I splashed water on him and we went on to finish Day 2 very strong and 56 at the finish (pulse taken in the shade on a hotter day with less humidity)

Tevis – WOW, all I can say is "WE FINISHED"!!! Super strong too.

And the not so good:

Star died suddenly in the pasture – an aneurism...and 12-days later, we had to put down Sister. Ironically, they were born 12 days apart.

Our 19 year-old cat had a stroke and we helped her to the rainbow bridge

And to finally break my heart, Bear's spleen ruptured, upon ultrasound, we discovered metastatic cancer in his heart and lungs – Dave and I spent the day with him and held him as he fell asleep in my arms for the last time

Last but not least, collapsing at the finish of the QSER Fall Ride – subsequently in and out of the hospital the final 3 months of the year, with no ability to in some cases even be around my horses (blood counts were too low) or with a PICC Line in, the ability to ride them

But dawn does rise again, on a morning you almost don't want to wake up to...with true friends and family helping you to see the light. The sun comes up, and one day, you welcome it, cry a few more tears and embrace life's magic, with love coming back in a different way. My dear friend Lanie sending me a stunning mare, born in her arms, Midnight Diva. My brother sending me a Hawaiian Cat, Kiki, a big rangy boy – very different from my 3 girls. And my dear friend Kim sponsoring someone else's black female German Shephard, delivering 13 solid black puppies...Life is rich and once again, Dave and I have a little boy to love that's all ours, ½ Black German Shephard, ½ Yellow Lab – BUDDY!!



So this weekend, I'll be giving back a bit to my friends by pulling together all the pictures and stories our club members have been sending and memorializing it in our annual Calendar, thankful that the roller coaster ride of 2016 is over and hoping the light is shining for each of you in 2017!

My Story

Dear, dear friends,

I am the silent one, you are my active partners. I thank you for being there and making Quicksilver such an interesting and all-embracing community that has supported me, taught me much and helped keep my faith and ambitions to do endurance rides. I have been a poor inactive member and I am sorry for that.

I bought my first horse, Katie, in 2008. I had fun and excitement for two years, learning and discovering what owner ship means and also the fascinating sport of endurance on a beautiful, eager, young Anglo-Arabian. My progress was due to the patient persistence of my true friend and mentor Tracy Hofstrand. Katie and I completed 5 LDs and our first 50.

A second milestone in my endurance experience happened five years ago. When Karla Perkins suggested I take her horse Cherry and join Judith Ogus for the last two weeks of the 2011 Pony Express. This extraordinary and unforget-table two weeks was my true introduction to the meaning of endurance and I loved every minute of it. Since 2011, filled with all the aspirations of an enthusiastic new participant who had discovered that she could do this thing, I worked with and cared for my precious horse Katie. Some of you knew her and understood what potential she had. We never realized that potential.

After my first 50 on Katie in 2009 and up to 2015 I dealt with two years of suspensory injury, followed by pigeon fever requiring two surgeries, navicular changes, and a prolonged uphill battle to reach that point where she could be conditioned enough for an LD. Dealing with continued fatigue, poor recovery, and respiratory concerns in a horse that was always willing to move out and make her best efforts I decided to turn her out into pasture. She only got worse and after a visit to Steinbeck Clinic Katie at age 12 years, was diagnosed with Silicosis and severe Osteoporosis. With a rehabilitation program she improved somewhat but before medical treatment could be applied her hip was broken. Katie was euthanized on May 2nd 2015. Her body was donated to UC Davis for research in to the connection between Silicosis and the development of Osteoporosis.

I retreated even more into the shadows and could not bring myself to join meetings or volunteer for anything. I kept riding thanks to a generous friend who did not have enough time to ride her little black Egyptian Arab regularly. I stayed in shape, followed Quicksilver emails, and read Quips. A few months ago I started a search for my second horse. This was disrupted by a visit to my family in England and the birth of a second grand daughter in October 2016.

In November I got a call from Judith about a chestnut mare staying with Becky Hart in San Jose. They said she did not fit into the lesson schedule and needed someone she could bond with. I have bonded with her. I call her Bella (aka Emira Afire). She has settled into her new pasture at Indian Hills Ranch in Milpitas despite atrocious muddy conditions. She is getting lots of schooling in our covered arena. There is nowhere else to go because of California's glorious rain! I'm signing up with AERC again very soon and looking forward to joining you (or racing you) on the trails.






