My Horseback Trek in New Zealand - 2003

What follows is taken directly from a travel diary I kept during a trip to Australia and the South Island of New Zealand in 2003. After spending a couple of weeks in Sydney and the West coast of Australia, we prepared to leave for NZ on a much anticipated horseback country trek... *Continued from February*

November 7th

Still raining in the morning, so we stayed in bed and relaxed. We figured we'd start out at around noon, rain or shine, because we had about 6 hours of riding to do to get to our next hut for the night. We set out and more desolate country (not even a live sheep) went by as we ambled around hills and valleys, crossed the Highway again, and headed for Lindis' hut. As desolate as this is, it's actually beautiful. Hard to explain. We rode through an area that was used for the Lord of the Rings movie. Some battle scene. Soon the terrain began to change a bit and we started to see sheep grazing in the distance. Lots and Lots of sheep...tons and tons of sheep!! Most of them had little itty bitty babies with them and they were so cute! Very scared of us, so we never really got to ride among them, but we saw them good enough We had to be very careful not to scare them too much, because the newborns can get separated from their moms and if they don't get found soon, they will die, and Nick promised the land owner that we would take care that this would not happen to the best of our ability. We had lunch on the trail again and pushed on until we got to the cabin. Same type of thing, not too well kept, funky outhouse, but with it's own charm. We're been drinking creek water so far, but this time we got ours way uphill from the outhouse since it was built right next to the creek. Yuck!

We were pretty tired by then and after setting up a fence area for the horses and cooking dinner, cleaning up, etc., we were ready to relax. The weather improve greatly and it turned out to be a beautiful day. Saw some ducks called Paradise Ducks, which are black and white, identical, except that one has a white head and the other has a black head. Not sure which one is the male or female.

Slept good, very little wind noise here. The night was cold and crisp and the full moon was so bright you could have read by it. I still have a cold, so I took some drugs and put myself to sleep.

November 8th



This was, so far, the prettiest trail. We set out and went on a trail that crosses the Lindis River about 20 times. Much more vegetation and trees around, and sheep, of course. It was a gorgeous day and we were very careful to put sun screen on often. We stopped for lunch next to the river, and since it was very hot, I decided to wash my hair...oh, bliss! It really felt good. We moved on and rode back toward the farm where we left our car. We've been averaging 3 miles/hr. or so, so I figured we must be doing no more than 15-18 miles per day. As we crossed the highway and rode along it for awhile, a bus full of Japanese tourists stopped, they all got out and took pictures of us..."Hey, look! Natives!" Click, click, click.

We got back to the place from where we started and talked Nick into taking the horses back to his house for the night so they could get a good rest. We set i[a tent and spent the night there. We were a bit cold, but we survived. The place is called Breast

has a nice little creek running through it, plus a couple of abandoned stone buildings and a place set up to shear sheep. All the machinery is gone, but Nick gave us a general tour and explanation of how it works. Once you get the sheep in for shearing, they get them one at a time, and if you lay then on their backs, they quit struggling, so you can shave their entire coat in one piece (the desirable way.) Then they put the wool on a table, pick off the yucky stuff around the edges, bundle it up, and ship it out. They get anywhere from \$60 to \$80 per sheep, so to make money you need a lot of sheep. A good shearer can shear a couple hundred sheep a day!

November 9th

We got up, broke camp, and got in the car to drive to Nick's place which is in Cromwell. We arrived and had breakfast at his



place (a nice 100-acre spread) and got going on the next leg of our trek to Mount Piza. The climb was pretty grueling, since it was all uphill until we reached about 4,500 feet. Horses were pretty tired and we gave them lots of breaks. The views were spectacular from up there. Lots of snow-covered mountains (their Alps) and deep valleys. Saw a few waterfalls and we even rode through some sections of the trail that were covered in snow. The weather was absolutely perfect, sunny with a light breeze - no complaints. One more yummy lunch on the trail and then we set out to reach our cabin for the night at Roaring Meg (there is a quaint story that goes with the name, of course), which is a government-maintained cabin with a real outhouse. Big corral for the horses with lots of grass, so they'll get a good rest tonight.

Our horses are a motley bunch of unknown origins by the names of Shiloh (mine), Charley (pack horse), Darkie (Nick's horse), and Leroy (Ron's horse.) I've been teaching Shiloh some stuff (like to turn towards me instead of giving me his butt) and we are getting along great. Ron's been having some trouble with his horse, but part of it is that he's not that enthused about this whole thing. He's pretty sore, too. Nick turned out to be a medical doctor in his "other life", who flies his small airplane (we saw it in the hangar at his place) to small villages and visits people who would otherwise not get to see a doctor. He lands the plane in the pasture, so if the horses and cows are in the way, he buzzes them, and they know to move. Then he lands on the next go-round. We've had some pretty interesting conversations, which Ron in particular has enjoyed very much.

There are a couple of abandoned stone cabins around here that were supposedly built during their "gold rush" era. Most are falling apart and won't last much longer, I'd guess. Wish we could stay here a couple of days...

From the California Dept. of Food and Agriculture Regarding Equine Events

Event Manager Responsibilities

An event manager is responsible for:

- Filing an Application To Register Equine Event (Form 76-024A) with the EMMP at least thirty (30) days before
 the event is to begin.
 - A civil penalty of \$100 \$2500 may apply for failure to register an event.
- 2. Collecting the fee of \$5.00 for each horse being entered or consigned to the event.
- 3. Remitting the fees collected and submitting the Assessment Report For Registered Event page (Form 76-024A) to EMMP within fifteen (15) days of the final day of the event.
 - A civil penalty of 10% of the amount due plus 1 1/2% interest/month on the unpaid balance calculated from the date of the event will be levied on an event manager that fails to remit collected fees within fifteen (15) days of the final day of the event.
- 4. Retaining event records for two (2) years after the final day of the event. To enable verification of the collection and remittance of appropriate event fees, event records must be made available, if requested, for inspection and photocopying by EMMP staff.
- 5. Collecting, signing, and promptly submitting exhibitor or consignor Drug Declaration Forms (Form 76-027) to the EMMP.

An event manager that fails to comply with EMMP regulations is subject to suspension from hosting or managing an event for a period of between 90-365 days for each violation. An event manager who violates such a suspension by hosting or managing an event during the suspension period is subject to civil penalties for each violation.

EMMP stands for Equine Medication Monitoring Program. Maryben confirms that Quicksilver has complied with all of the requirements of CDFA, but the requirement, in red above, is something new. Ride managers and future ride managers be informed.

Interesting History

Monday, February 7, 11:34 AM ET

ASHGABAT (Reuters) – Once prized by Alexander the Great for their speed and stamina, Turkmenistan's thoroughbred horses are being groomed for a series of beauty contests, ordered by a presidential decree published Monday.

President Kurbanguly Berdymukhamedov, who enjoys sweeping powers in this desert nation of 5 million and is known for his deft horsemanship, said national beauty contests for the ancient Akhal Teke breed should be held every April. The best horses of the breed, distinguished by shimmering coats, long delicate necks and legs and popularly revered as "the wings of the Turkmen," will be chosen "to promote the glory of the heavenly racehorse worldwide," the decree said.

Special awards will be given to craftsmen for the best carpet featuring the horse, the best "holiday attire" for the breed, the best portrait and even sculpture.

The Akhal Teke horse, given as a gift to several foreign leaders, is featured at the center of Turkmenistan's national emblem and enjoys cult status in the only former Soviet state in Central Asia where eating horse meat is strictly taboo.

The late leader Saparmurat Niyazov, who enjoyed a flamboyant personality cult, raised eyebrows in 2004 when he opened a gleaming \$20 million leisure center with a swimming pool, air conditioning and medical facilities -- for horses.


