ABSORBING HORSE SENSE AT STANFORD'S SCHOOL OF MEDICINE

On the first day of course No. 252 at the Stanford University School of Medicine, a pack of horses will be brought down from pasture near Portola Valley and herded into a corral, so the students can lean against the fence like wranglers and study at the stock.

They are looking for both leadership and followership in the horse hierarchy, as indicated by ear pinning, tail swishing, nudging and nipping. After observations, five horses will be culled from the herd and walked up to a sand arena where the medical students will get inside the fence and either hug the rails or tiptoe in among them.

They are not here to diagnose what might be bothering the animals. Medicine and Horses, an interdisciplinary



course, is not that kind of class. The students are here to learn how to deal with humans. Clinical Instructor Dr. Beverley Kane's job is to help them find the clues.

"Horses are not socially repressed like human patients are," Kane says. "They are superb at nonverbal communication." So are people, if the doctor knows where to look. That is the theory behind this spring quarter elective. Horsemanship isn't a prerequisite. It is more of a hindrance.

"People who ride horses aren't always all the way prepared to give that Zen mind attitude," Kane says. "In horsemanship, there is a right way and a wrong way. What we teach, there's no right way and wrong way. There is a way that works and a way that doesn't, and that's an exercise for the students to figure out."

The "equine experience" is fashionable curriculum at places fancier than Stanford. If you pay \$949.70 a day to get your life in balance at Miraval Resort & Spa near Tucson, part of your luxury package can be to get down low to the rear end of a horse, lift up a leg and pick out the hoof.

Stanford med students get to pick hooves too, but not until the end of the quarter.

It takes a while just to get them to climb into the ring. "We don't force people and make them feel bad because they are afraid," Kane says. "What we teach is how young doctors have to acknowledge their fear. Doctors are afraid all the time. That first major trauma that wheels in, you're afraid."

The class, Inde 252 for short, is offered by the Center for Education in Family and Community Medicine. Students must cover the cost of their boots or sturdy shoes -- no flipflops or sandals. They also must find transportation to Webb Ranch, a fruit stand on Alpine Road that has been operated for three generations on land leased from Stanford. Webb Ranch straddles Interstate 280 and the horse farm is on the west side. It is a 10- to 15-minute drive from campus, plus a mile up a rutted dirt road.

That's an easy commute compared to last spring, when students had to hump it over Highway 17 to Santa Cruz. Among the brave was Tracy Dooley, a fifth-year student from Berkeley, whose prior horse experience had been, "riding fat little ponies at Tilden Park," she says. "I was just looking for an elective that was different. It's definitely different."

This becomes instantly clear when the professor comes up the muddy road in a Mustang with a brass horse hood ornament and "HORSNSE" on her vanity plates. Kane is from Boston, but she's no Ivy Leaguer. Asked what got her to California she answers "my thumb."

She volunteered at the Berkeley Free Clinic and got



involved in a "barefoot doctor-training program." This was enough to get her admitted to UC San Francisco's med school in the late 1970s without guite finishing her undergraduate degree.

The concept of horses as med school instructors was pioneered by Dr. Allan Hamilton, a neurosurgeon at the University of Arizona. Kane started her course at UCSF several years ago, up in Petaluma. Last spring was the first time it was offered at Stanford and things got different from the start, out standing in the mud and rain.

"One girl put her hand right in the horse's mouth," Dool-

ey recalls. "I don't know that much about horses, but I know you're not supposed to do that. It shocked everyone and sparked a lot of discussion."

Kane asks students not to take notes. She doesn't want her students to think, because horses don't think. She wants them to feel. "Horses are about noticing the nonverbal signals that they give each other," she says. "For one reason or another people always end up crying in these classes because the horses bring out emotions in them."

Dooley did not see any crying, not even the classmate who put her hand in the horse's mouth.

The workload totals 24 hours -- a daylong Sunday session to calm the butterflies, followed by six Wednesday afternoons, for one unit of credit. There are no exams, though the horses receive a test of sorts.

"One of the things we ask the horses to do is an analogy for informed consent for a surgical operation," Kane explains. The way the horse signs the form is to walk across a tarp on the ground if consenting to the surgery and to resist if surgery is a no-go.

"The idea is that the horse is going to let you know whether he likes the way that you touch him or he doesn't," she says, "and you need to keep focused on the parts of the body that the horse uses to signal his displeasure."

Two effective signals for showing displeasure are kicking and biting. Neither has happened yet. "One horse did put his teeth on a woman's arm," Kane says. The student may have classified that as a bite, but the instructor didn't because the horse declined to clamp down.

"This was a person that had very poor boundaries," she says, taking the side of the horse.

It includes summaries of the current stuation from Dr. Eleanor Kellon (who has been spending countless hours working on this), with her posts that are most important for veterinarians tagged seperately.

There are links to the major government players and examples of some of the letters which have been sent, and a link to the Save Pergolide petition which currently has over 3500 signatures - we still need a lot more. The signature spreadsheets are being sent to government officials, state pharmacy boards and others every few days.

If you only have time to send one letter, send it to the adresses shown on the FDA/CVM contact link. If you have time to send more - every letter, email or fax counts.

The debilitating side effects of Cushing's Disease if not controlled may kill more horses than West Nile, Eastern and Western Encephalitis and other diseases combined. Pergolide is currently the only medication which effectively controls this disease - supplies are dwindling and the FDA is dragging its feet.

Dick Carter's wife Angie was transferred yesterday to O'Connor Hospital, had an angiogram where they found 99% blockage of an artery where a bypass had previously been done. 100 Mile 6-Day East Bay Hills Trail Ride To Benefit Bay Area Trails Wednesday, Aug. 29-Monday, Sept. 3


Ride Labor Day week with members of the Tilden-Wildcat Horsemen's Association and the Metropolitan Horsemen's Association in the East Bay Hills. Ride up to 100 miles in 6 days, or 14-18 miles each day in small groups at your own pace. Join us for one, for more or for all 6 days. The ride will follow and/or parallel the S.F. Bay Area Ridge Trail much of the first 3 days, and then move to Mt. Diablo for the final 2 days. We will spend 2 days riding from each of 3 different campsites.

Trails and Camps: Camp opens in Tilden Regional Park Tuesday, the day before the ride. On Wednesday enjoy sweeping Bay Area views from the trails in Tilden and Wilcat Parks. On Thursday we will follow the Bay Area Ridge Trail from Tilden through Sibley, Huckleberry, and Redwood Regional Parks and EBMUD Watershed, followed by a scenic ride in

Joaquin Miller Park, where we will camp on Thursday and Friday nights at Sequoia Arena. Friday's ride will pass through Redwood Park to Canyon on the way to Upper San Leandro Reservoir. Saturday's ride will include all of the French Trail in Redwood Park. Saturday afternoon we will move to Mt Diablo and camp at the Concord-Mt. Diablo Trail Ride Association's grounds. On Sunday and Monday we will be riding on Mt. Diablo.

Food and Evening Entertainment:

Breakfast, lunch and dinner will be provided for riders and campers, and hay, carrots and water for the horses. Swimming and showers will be available at Tilden and at Mt. Diablo. Evening programs will include a visit to the Chabot Space Observatory (5 minutes from Sequoia Arena), a harp



Costs/Benefits: This ride will help raise funds for the Bay Area Ridge Trail and for equestrian improvements on East Bay trails. The Bay Area Barns and Trails Trust will match the first \$5,000 raised for the trails The cost will be \$60/day, with a discount for 6 days at \$325.
