News Notes

This is a post about the importance of wearing the right safety gear for the job or sport you are doing, EVERY TIME you do whatever you're doing! My dad is a timber faller. On Wednesday, April 22nd, he was at work, and a 5-inch diameter limb fell a fairly long distance out of a tree and hit him in the shoulder, breaking his collarbone, 4 ribs, and completely shattering his scapula and the bones of his shoulder. Luckily, he had thick leather pads attached to his suspenders that protect his shoulders and make carrying his chainsaw over his shoulder more comfortable. The picture shows the one on the side that was hit with the limb. It has about a 1/4" deep imprint where the limb hit. If not for his protective gear he wouldn't have a right arm today. So, always wear your helmet when you're on your horse, your bike, your skateboard, your motorcycle, etc. Put on those safety glasses even though you look like a total dork in them. It's SO worth it!

Additional information by your editor, who also happens to be Steve's mother-in-law:

Lud and I went to see Steve this morning, April 25th, at his home where he is resting quietly with his right arm in a sling. I guess there is a certain amount of good fortune in that he is left-handed. I was asking him about "what happened?" The limb that hit him is called, in timber fallers' vernacular, a "widow maker." He said he was observing how his targeted tree was falling, and heard nothing to warn him, because the limb came down straight and vertical, causing little sound of limbs striking against other limbs. The marks seen in the photo are from the end of the limb where it had broken free of its parent tree. Steve, Katie, and her mom Janet had just last weekend ridden Lost Padres. Steve and Katie rode the 50-miler, Katie on her new mare, "Stevie", whom she bought from Judith Ogus. Katie said Stevie was perfectly behaved and very professional. Steve was riding his new horse, now named Brownie, whom he bought from Jeanine McCrary. This is the horse that pitched her at Cuyama and put her in a hospital in Santa Barbara. Steve liked the horse and decided to try him out. Steve and Brownie got along well, and Lost Padres was one of the horse's first endurance rides. Both finished successfully. Unfortunately, Steve's riding will have to wait awhile until he heals. They had been planning to do the Tevis educational ride this year.

PRODUCT REVIEW – "EQUIVISOR"

I only have two horses right now, but as I think back on last summer, I must have gone through about 8 fly masks! It seems that the favorite game at the barn while I am away at work is drowning things in the water troughs – and fly masks must be worth 3 points. More than once a perfectly good fly mask was ruined by the end of its first wearing, ripped off the face of the erstwhile owner and deposited in the nearest trough. For a while I gave up, and figured that the horses would just have to suck it up, but by mid-fall I had relented and brought a new stash.

That was why I eagerly purchased two new Equivisors when I saw them at an educational event at Loomis Basin in February. These masks seemed to be made of a much stronger mesh than the feedstore variety and they also have an extra strap that goes under the throat latch. The two adjustable straps have plastic latches that make it very easy to size, and then the extra webbing on the straps can be cut and the ends burned to ensure a good fit. They have a lining across the brow that protects from sun, holds the mask away from the horses eyes, and provides a bit of shade and insulation on the brow and providing UV protection which would be beneficial to horses prone to uveitis.

I have put these masks to the Jack and Bardos test, and as of this writing, they are performing with flying colors. I did leave too much webbing on the straps of Jack's mask the first day that he wore it, and it looks like it got both a bath a good stomping when I found it just outside of the paddock. It washed up just fine and suffered no damage.

The price on these is about \$25, and it looks like they are available from a couple of the on-line retailers.

Lost Padres Ride Story

On April 18th, I took my 7 year old Arab mare Stevie to her first 50-miler at Lost Padres (Stevie has one LD under her belt with Judith Ogus in 2013). We were joined by my dad Steve with his Arab gelding, Brownie, and my mom Janet with her mule, Millie. Brownie would also be doing his first 50 and Millie would be doing her first 25. My parents, both of whom have extensive endurance riding records, haven't been to a race for the past 14 years, so this was an exciting weekend on many levels!

Taking three new horses to their first endurance ride is always an experience in unknowns. Would Stevie, so relaxed and easygoing at home, turn into a fire-breathing dragon in the competitive environment of an endurance ride? Would her tendency to hesitate and play spooking games when asked to go in front be worse or better on ride day? Would Brownie hold himself together without bolting or bucking like he's sometimes fond of doing in high-pressure environments (answer....nople!)? Would the horses camp quietly, would they eat and drink well, did we have a good electrolyte protocol in place?

With so many unknowns in play, race day went off fairly flawlessly for our group. The LD ride not only had the same first 25 miles of trail as the 50's, but they started at the same time as well, so the whole family got to ride together for the first half of the day. Pretty fun! Stevie started the race relaxed and professionally and was going on a mostly loose rein after five minutes on the trail (I've never had that luxury!). My dad's horse Brownie bolted on the first hill after the start and we got separated from him with a handful of horses in between, but Stevie was happy to stay behind the unfamiliar horses by herself until we had room to pass, and then she speed-trotted in a nice relaxed manner until we caught up with our group again. Pretty impressive attitude for 7 year old mare at the start of her first 50!

Lost Padres is a gorgeous ride with a nice balance of tough hills and longer trotting sections. All three of our horses cruised at a nice working pace through the first 25 miles into our lunch stop. Stevie drank well, pigged out during her hour hold, and trotted nicely for the vet.

My mom only did the LD with her mule, so after our lunch hold was over my dad and I headed out by ourselves for the second 25 mile loop. Getting the two horses out of camp and down the road after lunch was both hilarious and exasperating. No one else had the same out-time as we did, so those poor horses had to walk all the way through camp, past all the other horses busy relaxing and eating, and head out "all by themselves". They didn't put up a fight about it, but their toes were definitely dragging and they were very obviously communicating between themselves about the idiocy of their riders who must not realize that the ride was OVER. Luckily, about a half-mile down the trail we were caught by some other riders and our horses decided we WERE in fact supposed to be leaving camp after all and the pace picked up considerably. Stevie, not usually a very willing leader, lead most of the second 25 miles and had a fairly strong second wind after the post-lunch doldrums wore off.

At the end of the day, this first-ride experience for our horses was a success! Everyone had fun, the start was fairly controlled, everyone took good care of themselves and we maintained a nice and steady first-race pace all day. Dave and Ann Nicholson and crew put on another fantastic ride and it was really nice to get together with the Quicksilver members who were there too!

I'm planning to take Stevie to her second 50 on May 30th at "Run for the Gold" in Mariposa. If anyone will be there riding the 50-miler and is interested in doing a nice, relaxed mid-pack pace and would like a riding buddy, let me know! I would love to have some company for Stevie on her second 50-miler, especially so we can minimize the after-lunch/leaving camp doldrums (I think the 50-milers leave camp twice on the afternoon loops).

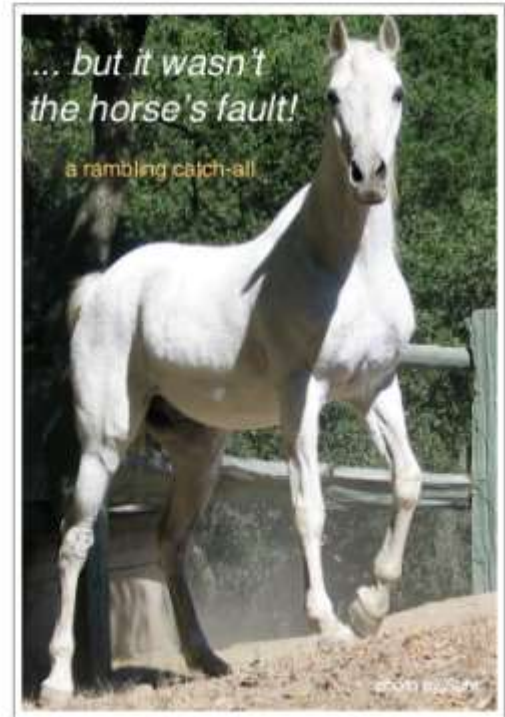
