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"If you don't buy him, I will..."

Those were the words Julie Suhr said when I told her I wasn't sure if I should get the cute little horse I had just seen. "If you don't buy him, I will..." Was she kidding? Maybe, maybe not. You just never know with her! Regardless, it was the final little push I needed to make my decision.

But let me go back to the beginning. I had lost my sweet gelding Solo in January of 2017. Quick-silver member Sandy Holder was kind enough to loan me her lovely Tally to keep my other horse, Tango, company, and I started looking for a permanent addition to our family. I have a non-negotiable issue with horses, you see... It has to be a *gelding* and it has to be *gray*. Yes, I know, it's silly, but if I'm going to live out my childhood fantasy, why not live it out to the fullest? Gray gelding or nothing, that's the final deal.

Well, for some reason, it turns out that gray geldings were a lot easier to find 20 years ago, so it took some time and several unsuitable/disappointing prospects before I found one that I liked. Ya Batal (meaning "My Hero" in Egyptian) was a 6 year old Straight Egyptian gray gelding, with about 30 rides in the arena, and one trail ride out in the big world. Having recently broken my back, I was a little hesitant to get such a green horse. I had started the three horses I owned so far, but my body was younger then, and in one piece... did I really want to get into this?

I took some friends with me when I went to see him the first time. I had to walk away for a while and have a good cry in private, since he reminded me so much of my darling Solo. My friends understood. I watched Jody Tuft (Ya Batal's breeder and owner of Valley Horse Center in Dixon, CA) ride him in the arena and he was lovely. I watched one of my friends ride him, and he was lovely. Because of my broken back, I was in too much pain to get on a horse, so I took lots of photos and videos and went home to think about it. I sent them to Julie to see what she thought... "If you don't buy him, I will..." she said.

The horse passed the vet check with flying colors a couple of weeks later, so I put my back brace on and rode him in the arena. He was lovely. "If you don't buy him, I will..." was still bouncing around in my head, so I bought him!

Ya Batal became Echo. He was supposed to be Jody's next stallion, but did not grow to the size she hoped, so at around two years old he was gelded. Our last two years together have been fun and in some ways a bit challenging.

About a year ago, he ran into a cable while running around loose on a trail behind my house. He badly skinned both front legs and we were concerned about a fracture. Fortunately, x-rays were clear, he was never lame and the hair grew back.

About six months ago, he had a bad fall and skinned his right knee clear to the bone. The vets at Steinbeck were very concerned that he had compromised the tendon sheath and gave him a poor recovery prognosis if that was the case. We treated, cleaned, bandaged and kept an eye on it for several months. He has a scar, but no other problems. I despaired a little wondering if this horse would ever be ready for a ride!

He definitely has opinions, but is very kind, and curious as curious can be... but most of all, I think he is an Old Soul. Nothing seems to upset him too much. Generally, his first reaction is to look at things and think about them. He drinks at every opportunity. He will never say no to food. Didn't care about the first time a blanket was put on him. Loads and travels great. Tolerates the beach and high surf fairly well. Loves new trails. Enjoys being in the front, middle or back. Camps like he's done it all his life. Respects the electric fence like a pro... can be a bit stubborn sometimes and hates fly spray (well, nobody is perfect!).

Finally, after what I felt was a reasonable amount of trail riding with increased distances and

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speed, I decided that we were ready for an LD!

The Cuyama Oaks ride was coming up, and since I love "Duck" rides, I set my sight on that. When we arrived, Echo looked around camp and promptly started eating grass. Not a peep all night. I rode on day two with QS member Alicia Stanton and her horse Sparkie as our chaperones, and the ride so completely exceeded my expectations, I actually felt a teensy bit guilty... and definitely a heck of a LOT happy!

Echo had a bit of a melt down at camp the morning of the ride. We were leaving one of his regular trail buddies behind who was screaming due to the fact that HIS pasture buddy was leaving him with rider Shannon Thomas on board. To be on the safe side, I hand walked him for about ¼ mile and things went back to normal once we got out of ear shot. I got on him and from then on, he crossed creeks, walked through bogs, passed horses and was passed with no fussing, climbed some gnarly hills and took great care of himself. We arrived back at camp 5½ hours later, sound and happy, with a 54 heart rate and an elated horse mom.

After a quiet night, we loaded up and came home. I was smiling the whole time... and planning the next ride. We will do a couple more LD's, perhaps two back to back, and then, if all goes well, maybe we will try a 50. More than anything though, we will continue to have a good time out there on the trails, which is what it's really all about!

"If you don't buy him, I will..." Thank you Julie, I'm so glad I bought him! You can borrow him any time you want!



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
