

Lud McCrary Celebrates His 90th Birthday

On Saturday, June 30th, Lud had a party! Organized and managed by his daughters, Ellen Rinde and Janet Webb, and his future granddaughter-in-law, Michelle Overbeck (who is also Big Creek Lumber's publicity director), there was a catered BBQ by Barbara's Catering from Watsonville. Daughter Susan Huff made her fantastic triple-berry cobbler that has become famous at potluck picnics. Michelle had assembled a photo timeline of Lud's life and experiences.

The food was excellent and there were about 80 people who came from far and wide—one of his longtime lumber business customers and associates came all the way from Los Angeles area, our financial advisor who has become a great personal friend, came from Discovery Bay on the delta, and numerous neighbors and former neighbors. Julie Suhr came with her daughter-in-law, and Joan Parsons, one of our riding buddies from Año Nuevo Horse Patrol, came from Santa Cruz. Chuck Edgemon, leader of the Año Nuevo Horse Patrol, came from Monterey with his partner, Wendy Robinson.

At one point, various people shared their experiences relating to Lud with the crowd. I was particularly interested in the reminiscences of our daughter Ellen who told stories of her experiences in growing up—how her father had put so much trust in her and her sisters to allow them to do things on their own, once trained to handle the challenges...running chainsaws, backpacking in the Sierras without us, swimming in Big Creek as children (without supervision), and riding and hiking all over the hills here at home.

Lud shared experiences of his youth—tagging along with his uncle—fishing, hunting, helping with his uncle's cattle, learning to split redwood pickets and shakes, working in Bel Air shipyards during World War II, studying diesel mechanics at a trade school in San Francisco, and joining the Merchant Marine at the age of 16, sailing out on various trips across the Pacific (shipping ammunition out and wounded servicemen back.) He recalled that on his last trip, his ship received radio communication that the U.S. had dropped the bomb on Hiroshima, Japan, thus ending the war. He has often said to me that if that horrific incident had not taken place, he would no doubt have never returned, as the Kamikaze pilots were sinking our ships. We found out during our trip to Japan in 2005, that most of the Japanese citizens were actually relieved that we did end the war, because carrying it on further would have resulted in many more deaths on both sides.

The BBQ was held on the site of the last vet check of Swanton Pacific 100, next to Big Creek, and the weather was perfect. It was a very memorable day from start to finish. What a way to celebrate a birthday!






