# Happy September Birthday to our Quicksilver Members and Endurance Friends

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#### Lyme Disease

Many body systems can be affected by **Lyme disease**. Symptoms vary from person to person and can come and go. Symptoms are generally classified into early or late. Early symptoms occur days to weeks after a person becomes infected.

#### Early symptoms include:

Flu-like symptoms such as muscle aches, joint pain, fatigue, headache, stiff neck, chills, fever, or swollen lymph nodes. Paralyzed muscles of the face.

Palpitations (common) or disturbances of heart rhythm (rare).

An expanding rash called erythema migrans, or EM. The EM appears 1-30 days after the bite of an infected tick, expands over a one to two week period, and then disappears. More EMs, not necessarily at the site of the tick bite, can show up later. The EM is usually painless. The EM varies in shape and appearance. On dark skin the EM can look more like a bruise. The EM is not present in some people, or it may occur on a part of the body that is difficult to see. Painful redness that occurs less than 24 hours after a tick bite and does not expand is more likely to be a local allergic reaction to the tick's saliva.

These symptoms can disappear without treatment but the infection may still be present.

If early Lyme disease symptoms are not recognized and treated adequately, the disease may progress and be more difficult to treat.

Late symptoms occur weeks, months, or years after becoming infected. Late symptoms may be the first sign of Lyme disease in some people.

#### Late symptoms include:

Numbness, tingling, or burning feelings in arms and legs.

Muscles of the face, arms, or legs may twitch or become weak or paralyzed.

Sharp pain in the arms, legs, neck, and back, may occur.

Increased sensitivity to light may be present.

Swelling and pain of one or a few joints, especially the knees. Joint swelling sometimes moves from one joint to another, and may come and go.

Difficulties with memory, concentration, learning, or speech in both children and adults.

Some Lyme disease patients also experience mood swings, depression, or abnormal thought processes.

#### **Diagnosis and Treatment:**

People with symptoms of Lyme disease should see their doctor as early as possible. Some tick-borne diseases in California (e.g., anaplasmosis, ehrlichiosis and babesiosis), as well as other diseases, can produce symptoms similar to Lyme disease. Thus, Lyme disease can be difficult to diagnose.

A physician diagnoses Lyme disease based on symptoms. Additional information useful to a physician in making a diagnosis of Lyme disease include:

Patient had a tick bite or was in an area where ticks occur. Because ticks are small, some people do not notice that they have been bitten.

Blood tests, but these need to be interpreted carefully.

Prompt treatment with antibiotics during early Lyme disease can cure the infection and prevent complications of late Lyme disease. If treatment is delayed, treatment can be difficult and recovery may take longer.

#### **Transmission in California:**

In California, the western black-legged tick (Ixodes pacificus) transmits the bacteria that cause Lyme disease. Western black-legged ticks are most common in the coastal regions along the western slope of the Sierra Nevada range. Each life stage of the tick attaches to an animal for several days to take one blood meal before maturing to the next stage.

Larvae and nymphs feed on small rodents, lizards, or birds; adults prefer larger animals such as deer. When larvae or nymphs feed on a wild rodent carrying the Lyme disease bacteria, the ticks may become infected and transmit the infection when they feed in the next life stage.

Only nymphs and adult females of the western black-legged tick can transmit Lyme disease bacteria to humans. Nymphs are found in cool moist environments such as in the leaf litter or on logs, tree trunks, or fallen branches under trees in oak woodlands. Adults are found on the tips of grasses and shrubs, often along trails.

Ticks do not jump or fly.

Nymphs can pose a greater risk of transmitting Lyme disease bacteria to humans than adults because they are tiny and difficult to see (< 1/20 inch, about the size of a poppy seed), and so may not be removed promptly. Nymphs are most active in spring and early summer, when people are most likely to be outdoors; adult ticks are most active from fall through early spring.

In some areas of California, studies show that a higher percentage of nymphs (average 5-15%, range= 0-41%) carry the Lyme disease organism compared to adult ticks (average 1-2%, range=0-10%).

This morning was race day, Sunday morning. We piled into the cars at 6 am. The races began at 7 for the 100 mile/160k and 7:30 for the 75/120k. Becky was doing the 160k and the rest of us were doing the 120.

When we got there I went to weigh in as my saddle arrived with my horse that morning, new saddle, new horse. Then I got to meet my horse. Very cool horse. He was probably around 16 hands with a lean racy body.

Becky started the race without an issue. Then it was our turn to get going. I mounted Opium and started warming him up. He was excited and I think he was worried that I was going to not let him do his job because he crow hopped a few times when I didn't let him canter right away. After a 20 min warm up with me riding him we were off. My instructions were to go with the lead group...cool.

The day flew by, literally. Opium was so professional. He is 9 years old and is totally focused. Along the trail there were pig farms with HUGE pigs in pastures right beside the trail. Opium didn't care but almost all of the horses we rode with did. It looked like pinball alley with horses bouncing from side to side going by the pigs.

Each loop I would receive more instructions from the trainer of the horse. It was funny because after the first loop he told me to go the same speed. I thought he meant same speed as in mph. later in the day when he said same speed again I asked just to clarify if he meant same literal speed or?? He meant same speed as the next fastest person, in other words go the same speed as the leader.

On the last two loops we sped up some more and Opium led most of the time. Opium was awesome. At one river crossing he galloped to the edge, walked through the water and while he was walking he put his head down and took a drink and never stopped walking. When he reached the opposite bank he hit solid ground and was galloping again.

At my third vet check I saw Sheikh Mohammed and thanked him for letting me ride such a wonderful horse. He told me to just enjoy myself and have a good time.

When I was leaving on my last loop Sheikh Mohammed was also leaving on a loop and I smiled at him and told him "to have fun" and he smiled and said "you too". Such a nice man.

The lead group was averaging around 13.5 mph for the first 3 loops. Then on loop 4 we went 14mph. Loop 5, I

averaged 16.5. Now you have to remember these were average speeds which adjust every time you have to slow for a road crossing, river crossing, etc so actual speed while riding was usually at least a mile an hour faster.

When I came in to my second to the last vet gate there were still 5 horses in the lead group. By the last vet check there were 4. When I left the last vet check there was really only one that would be able to be near me as my horse recovered so fast. (Opium was the first to recover at every vet check). I had a 3.5 min lead. It was a 12 mile loop. Around mile 6 the other rider caught me. When he did I sped up a bit more. His horse had to work so much harder than mine to make up the 3.5 min and now had no time to rest but had to accelerate. When we were in the last 1/2 mile we started to pick up the pace to about 20mph and by a little more than a 1/4 mile left we gunned it. My Anglo was much faster and I was able to pull him up a bit and still cross the line an easy 15 lengths ahead.

Opium and I had a wonderful day and won the 75/120 in a ride time of 5:26. After Opium passed his final vetting the whole crew of guys that worked on Opium at all of the vet checks, about 15 guys, picked me up and carried me against my will (This is very lighthearted) and just before throwing me in a water trough I managed to get Deborah's cell phone off myself! I was thrown in and entirely soaked, the winning tradition for these guys!

Devon also had a great day and won the young riders 75/120. Cheryl finished the 120 also. Becky finished the 100/160. That is 100% completion rate for the USA!! Yay!

Sheikh Mohammed's horse won the 100m/160k race.

In all it was a very awesome trip for team USA.

This is the eighth-grade final exam from 1895 in Salina, Kansas, USA. It was taken from the original document on file at the Smokey Valley Genealogical Society and Library in Salina, and reprinted by the Salina Journal.

#### Cell Phone Safety

Many riders carry cell phones when they go out alone on the trail. The following information could save a life. Sorry, I've lost track of who sent this to me. :-((

#### FIRST (Emergency)

The Emergency Number worldwide for Mobile is 112. If you find yourself out of the coverage area of your mobile network and there is an Emergency, dial 112 and the mobile will search any existing network to establish the emergency number for you, and interestingly, this number 112 can be dialed even if the keypad is locked. Try it out.

#### SECOND (Hidden Battery Power)

Imagine your cell battery is very low. To activate, press the keys "3370#. Your cell phone will restart with this reserve and the instrument will show a 50% increase in battery. This reserve will get charged when you charge your cell phone next time.

#### THIRD (How to disable a STOLEN mobile phone?)

To check your Mobile phone's serial number, key in the following Digits on your phone:

#### \*#06#

A 15-digit code will appear on the screen. This number is unique to your handset. Write it down and keep it somewhere safe.

If your phone is stolen, you can phone your service provider and give them this code. They will then be able to block your handset so even if the thief changes the SIM card, your phone will be totally useless. You probably won't get your phone back, but at least you know that whoever stole it can't use/sell it either. If everybody does this, there would be no point in people stealing mobile phones.

And Finally....

#### FOURTH (Free Directory Service for Cells)

Cell phone companies are charging us \$1.00 to \$1.75 or more for 411 information calls when they don't have to. Most of us do not carry a telephone directory in our vehicle, which makes this situation even more of a problem. When you need to use the 411 information option, simply dial:

#### (800) FREE411 or (800) 373-3411

without incurring any charge at all. Program this into your cell phone now This is sponsored by McDonalds.

The next morning he appeared in a town 100 miles away. He was arrested and tried for murder. At his trial, he was identified by several eye witnesses as the killer. His argument in court was since he was in a town 100 miles from where the murder was committed the morning after the crime, it would have been impossible for him to have done it.

Everyone knew it was impossible to ride a horse 100 miles in that amount of time. He was acquitted despite eye witnesses identifying him as the murderer. So, even in the time of the gold rush, when horses were a part of daily life, the idea of riding 100 miles in one day was considered so ridiculous that the testimony of the eye witnesses was thought to be mistaken.

Start: We will start the 50 mile ride at 7:00 from camp. The 25 mile ride will start at 7:30 AM.

IF YOU DON'T HAVE A CREW, we will haul whatever you might need to the vet check. These items will be returned to the check-in office at camp. Please label you crew bags with your name and the ride distance.

If You Are Pulled: If you are pulled at Smith Creek Road the same truck and horse trailer that brought your stuff will be at the vet check to haul your horse back, or your crew can return to base camp and get your trailer.

Finish Line Procedure: Once you finish the ride, present your horse to the vet for your post ride check. After your horse passes, take your card back to the finish line timer and pick up your award.

Trail Markings: The trail is marked with flour dots on the right side of the trail and signs. Do not cross over solid lines, do not look over your shoulder at signs. More trail and vet details at ride meeting.

Please clean up your camp - All manure and hay must be bagged and taken home with you or put in designated area. We will provide bags and cleaning tools.

Late Entries: The late entry fee will be enforced. If your check is not included with the entry, you are not entered. We won't cash your check until the day after the ride, so, pick up an entry now, and send them in for next month. Thank you.
