#### **RIDING IN TUSCANY**

My husband Ron and I just returned from three lovely weeks in Italy. We reek of culture, ancient ruins, pizza, cannoli, limoncello, high fashion .... and horse manure. Of course, no vacation of mine would go without at least ONE horse back ride, and after 30 years of marriage my poor husband has pretty much resigned himself to suffer the abuse.

Three lovely days were spent in the hills of Tuscany. far from any city, at a lodge that offers rides through the beautiful hilly country. I opted for the all-day ride and picnic (about 6 hours of actual riding) and my husband joined us at noontime and rode back with the group after lunch. The horses were a varied mix of thoroughbred-type and something else. We were told they are the "Tuscan" horses ... probably left over from ancient wars and conquests. Maybe something like our mustangs? Sizes, shapes, colors and attitudes were quite varied. I got a pretty little palomino mare called Azia. Built like a tank, and even harder to steer. A few minutes in the warming arena and we established go, stop, disengage and "I will reward you with release of pressure if you listen to me." Smart little horse, she figured it out pretty fast. Goes to show you that there are not hard-mouthed horses, just hard-handed riders ... but I digress.

town, smiling and shouting "buongiorno!" to everyone. The horses seem quite used to all this, and take it in stride. We have a group of about 10 riders, and people come out of their houses to watch us go by. I feel I'm part of a parade ...

300 years ago!

We ride on old. comfortable English saddles, snaffle bits. Most people in our group are pretty good riders. I hear German, Italian, English and French spoken around me in addition to the universal language of a soft nicker and horse hooves on the ground.






On our way to the trails, we ride through the small village of Montieri. If it weren't for the occasional car parked on the side of a far-too-narrow road, one could imagine oneself having been transported to another time, long, long ago. Cobble stones streets, sunset color houses with orange roof tiles ... laundry hanging to dry from balconies next to planters overflowing with multicolored geraniums. Church bells ring at 10 to the hour and the priest walks through the

Once past the village, the trails are mostly dirt roads that lead to old farms. Hills and forests make me feel we are home in California, just the trees are different. As we ride, we are able to pick bunches of wild grapes growing on the side of the trail. Tough-skinned, sweet, dark and ripe, they are best suited for wine making, but the novelty is wonderful none-the-less. Suck the juicy insides and throw out the shell. Wild berries are also in season, so once in a while we stop and munch on those, both humans and horses enjoying their ripeness.

Lunch is a picnic by the side of a clear running river. We gallop through the water to our destination and, slightly wet and exhilarat-

ed, we dismount, tie our horses in a grove of trees and sit on the grass. I am a little disappointed at the amount of trash I see, but it's a public place, after all. We feast on cheese, cold cuts, homemade ravioli, fruit, salad and a number of other goodies. While the horses rest, unsaddled, we take a side trip to an old abandoned convent on top of a hill. I am frustrated because I know I can take one hundred pictures and not capture its beauty. Nevertheless, I try.



The ride back is a little more sedate. We have a few short gallops, but the horses are getting tired. It rains for a few minutes and it feels good in the hot day. The clouds are beautiful and the thunder makes us think we are running away from cannons waging a far-away war. The sun comes out and we see steam rising from the horses rumps. I worry about ruining the tack, but in reality it looks like it has seen many of these rains before, so I just enjoy the moment.

When we get back, I feel a pang of sadness for the horses. Who will ride Azia next? Will they be gentle with her mouth as I was? Do her owners realize her saddle doesn't really fit her that well? Who is their farrier? Between all the horses we lost two shoes on our day trip! The hay they feed (in great, big rolls taller than I am) doesn't look that good ... I'm pretty sure they don't supplement with grain or use electrolytes or vitamins.

They tell me it's nearing the end of the season and the horses will be put out to pasture for several months to recover and fatten up from this year's rides. Still, I realize how much attention I, and the people I ride with at home, give to our horses. We work them hard, yes, but we care for them just as hard. It's the bittersweet feeling I always get when I ride a "rental string" horse. They are mostly tools to their owners. To us, our horses are members of our family. It was an unforgettable experience, but I'm glad to be home, riding my own saddle and trusty horses again. Somehow, I now appreciate them and the beauty around me even more.

# LLANO ESTACADO CHALLENGE

It's a long way from south of Houston to the Texas panhandle so before leaving for a ride that far away with a name like "Llano Estacado Challenge" I decided to look it up on the world wide web.

"The Llano Estacado is part of the High Plains, straddling the Texas-New Mexico border between Amarillo and Midland-Odessa, Texas. It is bounded on the west by the Pecos Valley, and on the east by the red Permian plains of Texas. It's an area of 37,500 sq. mi. The Llano is a very flat, semi-arid plateau, ranging in elevation from 5,000 ft. on the northwest to less than 3,000 ft. on the southeast. The Llano is dry and treeless, the prevailing wind is from the southwest, and mirages are a frequent occurrence under the hot sun." Llano is pronounced "Yano."

Coming out of Amarillo near the ride, it certainly looked like this. But just a few short miles from ridecamp at Plum Creek in the Lake Meredith Recreation Area, you come to the top of a steep hill and wow! You drop down sharply enough that your ears pop, into a huge basin with cliffs that match the translation of the Llano Estacado as a Palisaded Plain.

Ridecamp is an large open meadow surrounded by Cottonwood trees with plenty of room for large rigs and lots of grass for your horses because there had been rain recently. The camp is at an elevation of 2,900 ft. With the cliffs and hills we climb up to 3,500 ft. during the ride. At sunset the surrounding eroded cliffs glow red and pink in the setting sun.

The ride is hosted by the Crown of Texas Arabian Horse Club with Doug Blashill as the ride manager. There's a great group of volunteers including radio amateurs and the county sheriff

with some of his staff. It was clear that there was a very good interaction between the club and the Park Service which provided excellent support by mowing the ridecamp area and some of the more grassy trails.

The weather couldn't have been better for the ride – high 40's at night and high 60's during the two ride days. The ride can be very warm depending on the weather but we were lucky this year. It is a ride where you need to bring mosquito repellent but the chill at night combined with occasional wind kept the bugs away for the most part.

The ride was a 2-day combined 25/50 with about 35 riders the first day and 25 the second day. Starting time was shortly after sunrise at 7:30 with the first loop for the 50 milers an out and back of 25 miles on the basin floor. The terrain was mostly grassy dirt roads mixed in with technical sections of single track and more difficult sections with

names like the "Goat Trail" up above the stream and lake bed. Winning times for the 50 were about 5½ hours so it was a challenging ride.

The second and third loops of 15 and 10 miles respectively were more technical with lots of short ups and downs with great views out over the basin from the tops of the hills. One hill – called Big Bertha – was very steep but mercifully short. The ride also has a mini Cougar Rock section and another called the Chute where you go up a short rocky area then turn sharply up and left to reach the top. The LD riders did the more challenging second and third loops of the 50 mile ride. There were some colorful wild flowers due to the recent rain and a few deer bounding across the trail at times.


Riders came from as far away as Galveston, from near

Kansas City, and from six states. One of the riders has the goal of completing a ride in every state – she's up to 17 now and reached 5,000 miles at the ride. Another rider from Louisiana is trying to be the first LD rider to reach 1,000 miles in a season. She's on track for that now. One very focused rider was with her husband at the end of the second loop when his horse stumbled. He ended up going to the hospital and once she was sure he was safely off – finished the ride that day and the next.

Dinners were excellent each night with peach cobbler as dessert. The awards were very nice with completion awards of T-shirts and for top ten – nice windbreakers, 5-gallon buckets, ice boots, and mini-leatherman tools. The volunteers found a real terrapin and kidded about giving it as the Turtle award but the flora and fauna in national parks are well protected.

I can't say enough about the volunteers. They took tires to the nearest town to be repaired, brought back fuel for some of the drivers who were short, and made sure that one of the trucks was fixed that had a problem. The ride was very well organized with treats for your horse, packages of trail mix, and local coupons in the rider packet when checking in. I haven't seen a better marked trail than the ones we were on with ribbons, pie plates, and colored chalk on the ground.

Last year I couldn't get to the ride because I was evacuating from Hurricane Rita at two miles an hour along with 2.5 million other Houston area residents. I missed the ride that year but I'm glad to have attended such a great ride this year. It's well worth the drive to see a part of Texas that's so different with challenging and interesting trails and a great group of volunteers.



# **CASA GRANDE**

Hello everyone - I'm inviting all of you to vote (everyday if you can!) in favor of funding for the Casa Grande restoration from the National Trust for Historic Preservation. Please check out the website <u>www.partnersinpreservation</u>. com/bayarea and vote for this outstanding project. Your vote may make the deciding difference for an incredibly important building in Santa Clara County, state and national history.

So what is Casa Grande? Considered the second most historic building in Santa Clara County (after the courthouse), Casa Grande was built in 1854 in the town of New Almaden. Currently known as the Mining Museum for Almaden Quicksilver County Park and formally called Club Almaden in the resort period of the mid 20th century, Casa Grande was also the site of the mining manager residence during the mercury mining heyday (early 1850s to 1927). It is listed on the National Historic Landmark District register (one of the very first in the country!) and it is just a gem - check out the Department's website for more information - www.parkhere.org. After the County Parks Department purchased Casa Grande in 1997, it set out to restore the building. A restoration plan has been completed and the Department is currently drawing up detailed plans for the restoration. But the actual work will take a lot of money (\$5M at last count) and we are very much dependent on getting outside funding to help complete the work.

Your vote will definitely make a difference and if you could spend just a little time registering at the website - and then voting everyday until October 31 for this very, very worthy project, I sure would appreciate it. A lot of folks at the Department, the County and in the Town of New Almaden would also appreciate it.

If you could spread the word to your network of friends. family and colleagues – that would also be great. Your time spent voting for this project will pay back dividends for many years to come.
