Virginia City 100 - September 20, 2014



First and foremost, thank you to the most awesome crew a gal could have! In fact, Sam crewed for 3 of us ladies, including Judith Ogus and my friend JayaMae Gregory from up north. He was there at every stop with horse and people stuff immediately on hand, a big smile and words of encouragement. Thank you, thank you, thank you to my wonderful husband!

The VC100 is a super tough ride – I compare it to Tevis in difficulty but it has a different kind of "difficult". Lots of ROCKS and lots of LONG BIG CLIMBS!

Here are Judith and Mia, just before we went to vet in on Friday. Judith had a wonderful ride and finished in 3rd place! Her last time riding VC was in 1998 where she also finished in 3rd place and got BC on her mare Fames Excitement!





There were wild horses all over the place and here was a group who came into camp at one point in the early am to nibble on the ride hay. Someone took a photo of their feet to show how they looked like a farrier had been working on them — all those Nevada rocks are good for something!



I rode the entire ride with JayaMae Gregory on her Foxtrotter mare Asali who has now completed 3 - 100's this year – Twenty Mule Team, Tevis and VC100! An amazing feat for a non-Arab! This little mare is very tough and Fire decided he liked her enough to spend the entire day and night (in fact, it was 24 hours from start to finish!) Fire was very strong all throughout the ride and I really felt he was enjoying himself and the trail. He made it easy and fun for me – he's such a great guy!



Baily Canyon has a lot of rocks – it's renowned for that! Here is a view of it – actually, Jaya and I thought it was fun – technical and pretty in it's own way. It took an entire hour to finish this section. This is in the first 51 mile loop, before you go back to camp.



Here are some views from the trail – this is after leaving the Washoe vet check at mile 39 – we are going back up the mountain and headed for the S.O.B's. Anyone who has done Washoe knows about the S.O.B.'s. I don't have a photo of them. It wouldn't do them justice – the first one in particular. It would have been good to have a ride photographer there, just like at Tevis. It's like a long version of Cougar Rock – Fire leaped up the first part – it would have been a cool photo. Then it goes up, up, up for a long while – I'm guessing 100 yards of vertical? JayaMae was worried as we stood at the base of the first one and looked up. But the horses did great – had to stop a couple times, but went up that first nasty one nice and strong! The next one isn't so bad, and the last one is a piece of cake after the other two!

This is a view after you come down off the mountain, on the way to the first vet check at mile 24. Nice view of the mountains to the west. There was a spring that meandered down the road in front of us. Amazing to see water amid all the dryness.



We had to cross the railroad track 4 times on the 2nd loop – this was after the first 1 hour hold after completing 51 miles. This 2nd loop was 25 miles. We rode into the sunset and up over Mt Davidson in the dark. The weather was perfect! It wasn't that cold and there was a nice little breeze at times – can't get any better than that!

And some of the many the wonderful volunteers out in the middle of nowhere at about mile 60 or so, with a collection of yummy cookies and drinks for us. This is the stop before we went up Mt Davidson which is a roller-coaster- like trail way up high with beautiful views of the lights around Washoe Lake below. We had another 1 hour hold in camp and then left on our last loop of 24 miles which was relatively easy compared to everything else. We finished, coming in next to the cemetery, being led by Connie Creech, the ride manager. Ride camp was at least 1.5 miles away and we walked through the darkened streets, clip-clop of hoofs echoing off the buildings. This is my favorite 100 mile ride and I'm happy to have finished it 3 times now. I hope to ride it again next year!

Visitors at Virginia City





Someone who loves my horses very much gave them these cute ID "anklets". They attach with velcro and have your cell phone number engraved on them. In the event you have to evacuate your place in a hurry, or even have a neighbor turn your horses lose if you can't get there, they will have a number on them that can be used to reach you.

They are soft, stay in place really well, and clean up fine with just a rinse. My horses didn't even notice I put them on. I leave them on while they are in their corrals, but when I go riding, I take them off and attach them to my saddle. I may, after further testing, just leave them on all the time

As you can see, my boys are very pleased with their new "bling" and want to show it off.

They are made in the USA, by EquestriSafe.com, 877-600-1375. Unless your horse has really, really skinny pasterns, get the standard size.

More Stuff on our Trip to Siberia





On the official Irkutsk coat of arms, the "babr," a mythical animal with a sable in its teeth, represents a symbol of nobility and affluence. We also heard that someone got the animal a bit mixed up and put the tail of a beaver on it. Sables live in the forest environs of Siberia and were trapped for their luxurious fur. Nowadays, they are farmed for their fur rather than hunted.

The city of Irkutsk lies west of Lake Baikal, a UNESCO World Heritage site that has long been considered the "Galapagos of Siberia." The world's oldest, at 25 million years, and deepest lake at nearly 5,600 feet, the reservoir contains 20 percent of all the freshwater on the planet. It has species of animals found nowhere else in the world—freshwater seals among them.

The word on the coat of arms is "Irkutsk" in the Cyrillic alphabet, used in Russia. I was very fortunate to have taken two semesters of Russian at Cabrillo so that I could read the Cyrillic

alphabet. Some of the words were English words but were written in Cyrillic. Other words were Russian that I couldn't translate. It was like a puzzle all through our visit—challenging, but fun.



A small but particularly beautiful part of Lake Baikal. In some places, one could see the opposite shore as if looking across a large sea. It is just over 12,248 Square miles in size, 395+ miles long, and is very clear. It lies on a seismic rift zone.






