

Amazing trees of California

A massive tree: A tree called the General Sherman sequoia in Sequoia National Park is the

world's most massive living inhabitant. With a trunk 103 feet around and standing nearly 275 feet tall, old Sherman is made up of an estimated 52,508 cubic feet of wood. It is estimated to be between 1800 and 2700 years old.

You think that's old??: Amazing as a 2000 year old tree is, the oldest living thing on Earth is a bristlecone pine in Northern California White Mountains just

Bob Suhr A life well lived "Make it a good day"





Maybe the reason is that he was my very first horse. Maybe it's because of the sense of accomplishment I feel when I think about all the things we did together. Maybe it's because he was the childhood dream that actually came through... although at times, it seemed like a nightmare!

We were both VERY green when we met, and had some heated arguments which usually ended with me on the ground and him running off, that white Arabian tail held high in the air. But determination (or foolishness) eventually won, and we became a team. For 25 years we explored incredible trails, camped in amazing places, chased cows, patrolled the beaches of Ano Nuevo, rescued stranded hikers, competed (and won) in many Trail Trials, ate up the miles in many Endurance rides and gave hundreds of children their first "horsey ride". The scared, insecure young horse matured into a solid and reliable partner. I think the best proof of that was when we were at the Sacramento Sheriff Mounted Police Training one year, and Lazo stood rock still while a helicopter hovered about one hundred feet from us, at eye level. The wind, dust and noise were amazing, and so was my horse!

He "helped" me train my next horse, Solo, patiently teaching him not to bite, to poop outside the stalls and to be polite when taking treats. He also took a lot of abuse from said youngster... including being regularly body slammed while being the pony horse. Solo, being much lighter, would bounce right off, and if horses can roll their eyes, Lazo must have done quite a bit of that.

He taught me so much, starting with the fine art of listening. He taught me patience and endurance. He taught me not to take myself too seriously. He taught me to control my anger and walk away when I couldn't. He was the cheapest psychologist and counselor and a great listener. He seemed to know when I needed a hug, and would wrap his neck around me, or gently put his head on my chest and just stand there. Yes, he was and will always be "The One" for me.
