Horse of the Year

This year I am the chair of the Horse of the Year selection committee and as such am looking for a couple of members to help me make the decision. Nominations can be sent to Judy Etheridge--email missfire@yahoo.com, snail mail—P.O. Box 62, Sunol, CA 94586.

The Horse of the Year shall be chosen as follows:

Quicksilver **Horse of the Year** Award shall be given to one horse owned and/or ridden by a current Quicksilver member each year separate from the Hall of Fame Award. **Horse of the Year** shall demonstrate outstanding achievement in a single ride season in one or more of the following categories:

- 1. Outstanding performance at high profile endurance riders.
- 2. Outstanding accumulative record for the year (high mileage, numerous wins, numerous best conditions or top tens)
 - 3. Multiple offspring of a broodmare or stallion showing outstanding performance in a single ride season.
- 4. Any horse able to overcome adverse conditions (orphaned, serious illness or injury—not race related, etc.) and able to begin or continue an endurance career.

A horse may only be selected as Horse of the Year one time.

A committee of 3 shall review nominations submitted by the membership and select an individual that best deserves to be named as Quicksilver Horse of the Year. If no horses are nominated by the membership, the committee may select a recipient for the award.

Hall of Fame Horse Nominations

The **Hall of Fame Horse** committee consists of Julie Suhr, chm. and members Michele Roush, DVM and Pat Verheul. Nominations can go to any one of us. Please be sure to include a picture of your horse so if it is chosen the picture will be in the calendar. My prior e-mails have said the award would be a blanket. The Board has decided to go back to the traditional plaque. Nominations are due by November 30, 2012.

Book Review Bold Spirit by Linda Lawrence Hunt

I love pioneer women's stories, and this one did not disappoint me. This is what the back of the book says about it, and I think it sums it up pretty nicely:

In 1896, a Norwegian immigrant and mother of eight children named Helga Estby was behind in taxes and the mortgage when she learned that a mysterious sponsor would pay \$10,000 to a woman who walked across America. Hoping to win the wager and save her family's farm, Helga and her teenaged daughter Clara, armed with little more than a compass, red pepper spray, a revolver and Clara's curling iron, set out on foot from Eastern Washington. Their route would pass through fourteen states, but they were not allowed to carry more than \$5.00 each.

As they visited Indian reservations. Western booming towns, remote ranches and local civic leaders, they confronted snow storms, hunger, thieves, and mountain lions with equal aplomb.

Their treacherous and inspirational journey to New York challenged contemporary notions of femininity and captured the public imagination. But their trip had such devastating consequences that the Estby women's achievement was blanketed in silence until, nearly a century later, Linda Lawrence Hunt encountered their extraordinary story.

In her later years, Helga told her granddaughter: "Take care of this story, honey". I am glad Linda took the time to do an amazing amount of research to put this almost lost and forgotten story back together.

Exploring Scotland and Isle of Man

We left San Francisco on September 17th, after waiting for many hours in the airport lounge. There had been some sort of holdup of our British Airways flight and it was long overdue. On the London end, we arrived the next day, due to flight time and the 8-hour time zone difference, transferred to a flight to Edinburgh, and arrived THERE just in time to settle in for a good night's sleep.

From our hotel in Edinburgh, we walked out along the quiet street the first morning and Lud found several Sequoia Gigantea trees—no coast-type redwoods, but several of the Sierra-type redwoods. The Brits and the Scots had planted numerous foreign species of trees and plants in their gardens. It was quite the style in the past.

We had three days in Edinburgh and had good times there. We took a tour of Queen Elizabeth's yacht, "Britannia", now docked there in retirement because of the great cost of sailing it all around the world. It must also be costly just to dock it there and maintain it, but not as bad. It was interesting to see all the rooms and read the descriptions of family life aboard the vessel. It was one of the Queen's favorite places, because she could relax and get away from crowds of people and her royal responsibilities. It is filled with mementos of their world travels. Lud wanted to see the engine room, as he had spent a couple of his teen years in the Merchant Marine in the engine rooms of several transport ships.

As I always do when traveling nowadays, I try to add to my growing collection of letter knives. I haven't a clue how this got started, but I must have a couple dozen of them—from Mongolia to the Navajo Nation in Arizona, from England to Japan, from China to Ireland. I set out to find a Scottish one. Our first attempts were not fruitful, but finally I was willing to settle for a "dirk", a small pointed knife worn in the top of a knee-high sock in the full Scottish dress regalia. As we went through museums, Lud, unbeknownst to me, was searching for letter knives for me. He found one in the gift shop at

the "Britannia" and later—one in a gift shop at Peel, Isle of Man.



While walking around the streets of Inverness, I came across a Clark's shoe store. Lud's ten-year-old casual dress Clark's shoes had given up in Edinburgh—the sole simply separated from the body of the shoe. Funny how he came by those—in 2002, while walking the streets in Galway, Ireland, he remarked that his New Balance running shoes were uncomfortable. At the very moment, we were walking by a Clark's shoe store, and I grabbed his arm and dragged him into the store. Within minutes, the nice man in the store had fitted him with a most comfortable pair of shoes, which we bought on the spot. Ten years later, they gave up and it seemed that we might find a similar pair in the store in Inverness, Scotland. After checking out several pair, I spotted a some that looked almost identical to the ones he had

lost, so we bought those and Lud walked out with happy feet.

We stopped in St. Andrews, known as the "home of golf," but since Lud and I aren't golfers, it wasn't quite as interesting as it could have been. We took a walk up the hill to see the University of St. Andrews, Britain's most prestigious, and the third oldest university in the English-speaking world, proudly represented as "the place where Prince William and Kate Middleton met." Lud, always with an eye open for trees, found another Seguoia Gigantea.

We drove to Glencoe in the highlands, and the mountains, streams, waterfalls and scenery were gorgeous. I wanted so badly to get out on a trail and hike for a few hours, but of course, we couldn't. We were on a bus, on a tour, and personal preferences were subjected to the tour guide's previous arrangements.

We spent quite a bit of time at the site of the bloody 1746 battle of Culloden, where the Scots were routed by the British and thereby lost their independence. We walked around the site (after seeing the excellent museum) and could see how the Scots were so badly beaten. It was a nearly flat moor, boggy in spots, with no cover.

After being in Scotland for a good many days, we flew over to the Isle of Man. We had been there in 2002, but this time we learned so much more about this proud little island, with it's 1,000+ year old Parliament, it's renown for giving women the right to vote at least 30 years before America did, and it's quite successful way of managing its own affairs, even though it is technically a British protectorate. It's symbol is three legs, formerly kneeling, facing east as if in


obedience to England, but now standing and facing west, showing their proud independence. They do not answer to the British Parliament at all.

Further along our way, the bus pulled into a large lot and parked. I think our Santa Cruz tour leader and historian,

Sandy Lydon, remembered something of interest that had been there before, but now it was merely a small market square. Attracted to a sign that said "Horse and Rider", Lud and I found it was really a tack shop of extraordinary variety and quality, not a pub, as we had first thought.

Sandy had brought a small bottle of water from Loch Lomond in Santa

Lomond in Scotland. We had a special little ceremony, standing on a dock,

while Sandy returned the water to its original namesake lake. It was a lot of fun and the subject of much humor.

We took the tramway to the top of Snaefell, 3,000 some-odd feet of elevation, the highest mountain on the Isle

We passed a farm with a sign advising us that it was a retirement home for old and retired horses, some of which had been used to pull trams along the streets of the capital city, Douglas. We crossed a small bridge where we were advised to say, "Good morning, little people!" to ward off any mischief from the fairies who were said to live under the bridge. And then the tour guide, an Irishman, kidded us for being so gullible.

On one of our days, we went to the preservation village of Craigneash, used in the filming of "Waking Ned Devine." It is a national site with all the buildings kept as they were in days gone by. In a small café, I bought a couple of chocolate-coated ice cream bars and we ate them as we trudged up the hill to meet our bus. The thick, sturdy sole of my Ariat shoes caught on the rough pavement, I fell to the asphalt, skinning my right hand and both knees, and then flipped head over teacups over the concrete curb into the grass. One of our group said, "Barbara, are you all right?" Lud, ahead of me, turned around in concern, as at that moment, a truck had passed him and he feared I had been hit. People who saw this graceful departure said I never lost my ice cream and when I stood up, I commenced eating it again. Chocolate does have its priorities! A very solicitous and well-prepared couple, out for a hike complete with a day pack, pulled out disinfectant and bandages and attended my hand.

After leaving the Isle of Man, we flew to London for our last day in the United Kingdom. Before we left home, nearly two weeks earlier, we had contacted old friends, Pat and Mike Brock, from Levi's Ride & Tie days in the 1970s, to let them know we were going to be in London on our last day and would have some time to visit them. This couple, once San Franciscans, were offered jobs in London at least 20 years ago and never returned to the USA. Their two daughters, born in California, now speak with heavy British accents. We were stunned to find that the girls both remembered us from 1996, when Lud and I went to England and stayed with them for a few days before striking out on our own—west to Cornwall and north to Scotland. The younger daughter is in university studying medicine, while the elder one has already graduated and is employed in some sort of technology job that I didn't quite grasp. It was such fun to see all of them again, to visit and have dinner with them.

Before dinner, Pat took us to an extensive display of ancient armor, collected by the late titled resident of the mansion that is now a museum. It was quite fascinating. Along with cases of battle axes, swords, and other life-threatening equipment, and various styles of body protection, there were two life-size horse and rider models, fully outfitted with armor—horses and riders alike. I couldn't photograph them because flash was not permitted, and I couldn't figure out how to disengage the auto-flash on my camera. Such a disappointment...

We were sorry to leave the next day for the long flight back to San Francisco, but we arrived in the evening, so that when we got home, it was time to go to bed and get some sleep. It had been quite an adventure...




