

We managed to keep a nice pace until we got to the last few miles, which were all downhill. At this point, my calves were reminding me that it had been a while since I had done anything longer than 20 miles! No matter how sternly I told them to shut up, they kept whining... sheesh.

Camp was now in sight and we all got a second (or third?) wind and came to the finish with painfully big smiles on our faces. Both horses vetted through great. I had the added bonus of Tango not having a sore back in the least! He has had some consistent problems, and I am now wondering if this will be another great side effect from the Sneakers. More testing required, but for now I will take it with a smile.

We had a yummy dinner and a nice rest before heading home. A spectacular sunset was a perfect close to a great day. Too many folks to thank for putting on a top ride, but you know who you are. THANK YOU!! As I snuggled under my lovely "Trilby made" blanket when I got home and while looking at my ride photos, I thought about how incredibly blessed we are to be able to do this amazing thing with such willing and lovely partners and friends! I Want to Ride!

I want to go do a ride, I really do. Since 2002 when I first entered a Limited distance ride with my Paint mare, I have done at least one ride, if not more, a year. But I have managed to complete 2016 with NO rides under my belt! Let me describe the reasons why.

During last year's Lake Sonoma ride, my gelding complained that the bit was not comfortable in his mouth when I had to constantly remind him to go at my speed instead of the speed he preferred. So after the lunch stop, I took the bit out and decided to ride him in his side pull. Yeah! That was a very quick loop we did!!

Upon returning home I had my vet come out to check his teeth. He said everything looked good. So I thanked the good doctor and turned out my boy in the big playground/turnout pasture. Within minutes he had ran around the whole

20 acres and came charging down the hill and slipped and slid and fell into the wire fence, got his leg caught in it and sliced his right front leg open 6 inches long and 3 inches wide. Good thing the vet was still there. He spent an hour cleaning up the wound and stitching it up.

The next day he had ripped his bandage off and discarded it in a corner of his paddock and split all the stitches and had an ugly oozing wound! At this point it could not be stitched back again so I had to wrap it and doctor it for 8 weeks. He healed nicely. Never took a lame step.

We rode a bit as he got better but he was now totally out of shape and was turning into a little potato. In February I decided to purchase an awesome ranch property in Hollister. Between putting in an offer and getting through the loan process and selling my old house it was April before we were settled in. I was planning to move the horses in June. But by then my horse had picked an argument with his roommate and sliced the same part of his leg open AGAIN!!! Another 6 weeks for stitches and bandages to rule my life and no riding. The potato was turning into a pumpkin!!

I did move them into their new digs in June and have been thoroughly enjoying being a ranch owner and taking care of my horses by myself. It was all new to me and I was learning as I went along. There were days I forgot to close the barn door and they had come in and knocked everything over and ate as much hay as they could possibly consume! There were days when my neighbor would call and say they had walked out of the "not so hot" tape fence and were visiting with her horses. Once I left the pasture gate wide open and they went for a mile long walk and someone called and said, yes you guessed it!

I am still learning and loving every minute of it. We finally started slowly conditioning again. But not for long! He contracted an upper respiratory infection which needed antibiotics and rest! So another 2 weeks off. I was hoping to do the Quicksilver fall classic limited distance but he was still so out of shape I thought that would be too much for the pumpkin!

So as 2016 is coming to an end, I have successfully not competed at all this year. The pumpkin is round and happy and spoilt and out of shape still. Oh well, I am hoping for a better season in 2017. But I will continue to enjoy being able to see them and play with them any time I want instead of having to drive to the stables. They seem to like that too. They are not too happy that I am remembering to close gates and doors, though!!

Katie and Stevie Go to Cuneo Creek

The Cuneo Creek Endurance Ride in Humboldt Redwood State Park has been a special favorite of mine ever since my first race there in 2010. My race at Cuneo Creek in 2010 marked my return to endurance riding after a hiatus during college and was my first race with my grandmother's sturdy little horse Jess, as well as being Jess's first full-length endurance race (we completed back-to-back 50's that weekend). I've since raced and completed at Cuneo Creek three more times, including a 75-miler on Jess and Stevie's first 2-day 100.

This year, Stevie and I traveled to Cuneo Creek with Jeanine McCrary and her mare Vixie. Even though the drive is fairly long, it's a really easy straight shot up Highway 101 with very little traffic, interesting scenery, and a great safe rest stop we've discovered for taking the horses out to stretch their legs and eat a little grass. We got to camp just after noon, scored a great campsite with shade, and had a good time visiting with friends and pre-riding the morning start.

Stevie is a very accomplished and easy-going little camper in her second season, but sometimes it takes her a couple of hours in camp to fully relax from the trailer ride and really start packing in the food and water. My strategy with her is to lightly electrolyte her with wet mashes for a few days before a race so she gets in the trailer fully hydrated, and then settle her in camp with a big sloppy mash and more electrolytes as soon as we get to camp. This helps her relax after the trailer ride and kicks her into gear with her eating and drinking. What I noticed at our last race however, is that she gets really picky about eating a beet pulp-based mash at a race. It just doesn't seem to be her most favorite food and I don't think she likes the texture all that much. The result is she only picks at her mash when we're at a race and doesn't get her full dose of electrolytes, so I have to make up the remainder by dosing her out of a syringe. Much less exact, one extra step, and I end up throwing away a lot of uneaten mash. So this race I tried something new. Instead of using beet pulp to add bulk and soak up water in her mashes, I substituted StableMix pellets from Elk Grove Milling. Those pellets soak up a TON of water, and make a really smooth and palatable mash when combined with the other ingredients I put in (rice bran, a yummy senior feed, Platinum Performance). The result is that Stevie gobbled down every single bite of mash as soon as she got off the trailer, practically begged for more, and started drinking and refueling earlier than she usually does the afternoon before a race. You know it's yummy when she manages to get mash in her eyelashes. Success!

The morning of the race was textbook. Stevie is a treat to start; focused, forward, and easy to manage. What I really liked about this race was that I was able to see a significant improvement in her strength over the same course from her first endurance season to her second. She felt stronger on hills and is really using her hind end more effectively this year. I'm excited to see her get even better as she builds more conditioning. She's also developed a really efficient downhill walk. The morning half of our race was really pleasant. We made good time, rode off and on with some very nice ladies, and really enjoyed ourselves. One of the ladies we rode with was riding the politest acting stud I have ever been around. I seriously wouldn't have even noticed her horse was a stud if she hadn't been camped right next to us and I hadn't already noticed the extra dangly bits. They rode with us all day and he was a perfect gentleman. Neither of the mares we were riding seemed to mind having him along one bit.

The afternoon loop is really beautiful at Cuneo Creek. It has a gorgeous stretch of trail in the really huge redwoods. We have big redwoods at home, but these are GIANT. It was going along pretty good until about the 40-mile mark, and then we had what I'm calling "The Dramatic Yellow Jacket Event".

Unfortunately, the area where the race was held was having a particularly bad yellow jacket year. Apparently there are fewer bears in the area so they aren't digging up and eating as many yellow jacket nests as they usually do. We had hit a large nest during the morning, but luckily we were on a wide fire road and we were able to get by them without an issue. In the afternoon, we weren't so lucky. We happened to be on a really long section of trail that was narrow single track with a vertical drop-off on one side and a steep up-sloping bank on the other. Jeanine was in front, so her horse hit the yellow jackets first. Vixie started bucking, and instead of moving forward to get away from the bees, she just bucked in place and wouldn't move forward. I was right behind Jeanine, so Stevie and I got stuck right on top of the nest. It was about the size of a dinner plate, and the bees were boiling out like crazy and MAD. I've never had Stevie in bees before, so I had no idea what to expect. She held it together pretty well for a few seconds, but then it was just too much and she started bucking too. Luckily Stevie's buck is very smooth and very straightforward, so as long as you stay centered it's an easy ride. She also decided we had to get out of there NOW, and since Vixie was frozen in place and blocking our escape she dove off the side of the bank (which luckily was slightly less than vertical where we were), slid down a few feet, pivoted on her hind end, and popped us back up onto the trail in front of Jeanine and Vixie. All I saw as we went over the bank were Vixie's hind hooves heading straight for my face, but luckily Stevie was moving so fast they never had time to connect. As soon as we were up on the trail again, Stevie took off at a fast trot and we got out of range of the bees pretty quick and I was able to jump off, get her to stand still, and wait for Jeanine and Vixie to catch up once Vixie got moving again. With all the factors in play, we were REALLY lucky we escaped without a major accident. If we had been in any other spot on that particular trail it would have been a different story altogether.

All and all, I got a really hot sting on my knee, Stevie got stung quite few times, and Vixie got stung bad enough to end up with nasty welts all over her hind end. Other than that though, both horses finished really strong and looked great after the 50. We had been planning to ride a second 50 the next day, and both horses looked more than able to


complete, but since we had to go on the same trail where we ran into the bees, we decided to call it a weekend after just one day. I think we felt like we had really lucked out getting through the bees without a major accident the first time and we didn't feel like pushing our luck. I think most of the other riders on the 50 felt the same way, because very few decided to go out on the second day. Every single person I talked to had a dramatic bee story, and many of them were far scarier than ours!

Overall though, we had a great ride at Cuneo Creek and it's still one of my favorite rides on the calendar. You really can't beat the trails, beautiful scenery, excellent management, great campground, and hot showers this ride has to offer.






