I've been riding Endurance for almost 30 years, and I've been rained on only once... it was a Desert Gold ride exactly 10 years ago. It threatened to rain all morning and eventually, for about an hour, we got a good shower while out on the trail. Other than that, I've been rained on at one of many camping trips at Point Reyes, but only during the night... and there was that one interesting camping trip to Henry Coe about 30 years ago where it hailed on us for about 10 minutes, so, I can definitely say that the "rain gods" have smiled upon me... until now, that is.. The odds finally caught up with me big time!

I just got back from the Gold Shuffle ride near Wheatland, and boy oh boy... did we (my horse more than I) get wet! I arrived on Friday planning on riding two days. It was lovely weather and for a few hours I deluded myself thinking that the weather man was wrong. Hah... as soon as the sun went down, the skies opened up and the heavy rain poured on and off all night.

When morning arrived, everything was soaked, including my horse. I had dutifully put up a tarp between my trailer and some trees, providing him with a nice dry "stall". He liked it at home, but I didn't count on the sound the rain made on top of it. He definitely did not like it and spent the entire night as far away from it as he could get. His blanket kept him warm and dry, but I felt pretty silly having gone through all that trouble.

We had heavy clouds all around us, but no rain. The well marked trails were beautiful, fairly flat and very, VERY slippery. There were some areas with great footing where we could make up some time, and others that were treacherous even at a walk. Tango did the splits a couple of times, but didn't seem to mind. We had a thirty-some-mile first loop with a quick P&R/trot and no hold due to the cold temperature and drizzle. On our way back to camp (and lunch) it rained pretty hard for about 1/2 hour, but not too cold. I was very glad to have a good rain jacket, though.

Riding by the firing range was exciting (who would have thought people go to an outdoor firing range at 7AM on a rainy wintery day?) but Tango was on a mission, and other than a little jerk every time someone shot, he did not slow his pace. I love the smell of gun powder in the morning... but I digress.

We had only a 1/2 hour lunch break, again, because of the rain and cold. I stayed longer, because Tango had not eaten much all night due to the evil tarp, and I wanted him to fuel up. The second loop around the lake shore was mercifully short (about 10 miles) and mostly flat. The few hilly parts with single track trails were the worst for slipping and sliding, but the lakeside trail was much nicer than it was last year. I don't know if it was because the level of the water was different, but last year we had to do several miles with sharp shard-like rocks sticking out of the ground that poked the horses legs pretty badly. I think this is where Tango got his nasty case of scratches. If it was something else, I hope that a heavy slathering of Desitin applied before the ride and keeping my fingers crossed will prevent him from getting them again this year!


We came in 15th place and Tango passed his vet check with flying colors. After doing the 60 Años ride (10+ thousand feet of elevation changes!) two weeks ago, this ride seemed really easy terrain-wise!

We had a lovely roaring fire at camp each night, and lots of people came and sat by it and talked. I made a few new friends and met up with a few old ones. It was quite pleasant.

I saw only Jeff Lutenauer from QS there. I think he rode day 1 and day 3. He said day one (55 miler) was really tough.

After hearing the weather forecast, I decided to withdraw from the Sunday ride. The ride manager said they were going to cut out some of the most slippery trail sections, so I have the feeling it was a pretty easy ride, but I'm glad I didn't stay. Last night it rained again - so hard - I could hardly sleep with the noise. One advantage was that I didn't have to refill my water buckets! Ha!

This morning I watched the riders leave, packed up camp, and hit the road. Before I left, I took a photo of the sunrise. I'm more of a sunset gal, but have to admit, it was pretty. About an hour into my trip home, the heavens opened up and I was very glad to be inside my cozy vehicle rather than out there on the trail. Guess I'm a wuss, and I really hope I have paid my "rainy day ride" dues for at least another 10 years!

Sesenta Uno Años Ride

Debbie Boscoe and I drove together to the Sesenta Uno Años Ride with the hopes of riding all three days. My mare, Mia, is in the War Mare standings and though she will not be able to be #1 in the category, I was hoping to at least keep her in the top ten. Several people had warned me that the ride was very difficult with multiple steep ascents. Having completed both Tevis with its infamous canyons and Virginia City with the equally infamous SOBs, I figured Mia and I were well prepared for anything. The first day of the ride was spectacular - a long gradual climb took us above the fog level and we could look back and see riders behind us winding their way up the hill.

The ride takes place on the 37,000 acre Rancho San Fernando Rey north of Santa Barbara and is one of the original Spanish land grants in the upper Santa Ynez River Valley. With cactus and century plants emerging from steep slopes, rocky creek crossings, long flat channels running between the rolling oak studded hills, it looks much like it did 200 years ago. The only hints of modern adaptation are solar panels erected to drive the pumps by every water tank.

I loved the ride. There were technical spots, long flat stretches great for cantering, steep climbs up and down and many gradual slopes ideal for trotting. The views were spectacular. I highly recommend the ride to anyone who has not yet done it.

Though Mia and Cathy LeFeber's horse, Baron, snarl at each other when we condition together, the two get along famously at rides and we paired up for all 3 days. Baron and Mia were superstars - eager and tough and pulling each other along out in front the first two days. They both recovered quickly at the vet checks and only faltered in enthusiasm on the second day after lunch when there was a long period with no water. We got off and let them nibble whatever minimal grass we could find, then dumped all our own water in our scoops so they could drink. Mia slurped up every drop.

All four of us were elated when we arrived at the first water trough, where Lynne Glazer happened to be photographing the riders. From there on in, the ride zigzagged back and forth to accumulate mileage. As so often happens on rides that zigzag, our horses manifested their disapproval by slowing down on the zags away from camp and speeding up on the zigs heading home. However, they were generally good natured, and every day, when we reached the stretch of road that lead back to camp, they both wanted to race. Cathy, my dear, dear friend, let Mia come in ahead of Baron everyday so Mia could get more points for War Mare. I hate to imagine what the two very fit horses would have done if we had allowed them to race. On the first two days Mia came in first and Baron second and I am proud to say that Mia also got BC on those days. On the third day, I started out a bit ahead of Cathy because Mia was eager to go. I was riding with a friend and chatting way too much because we missed a turn and ended up losing about 15 minutes. By then Cathy and Baron had passed us, but our companionship seemed fated. We eventually caught up and happily rode together for the rest of the day.

On the first loop there were some narrow and harrowing trails that skirted the edges of washouts. Though one of Baron's hind feet slipped off the trail on one of these, we made it through safely. Then we decided to take it easy because the horses had worked so hard on the first 2 days. We got off on most of the descents and slowed down our pace. I believe we came in 7th and 8th that day (not sure because there was a mix-up with one of the front runners who went off trail) and Mia received awards for overall fastest time and overall Best Condition for the 3 days.

Mia and I owe so much to Cathy and Baron for their support and great companionship. Debbie Boscoe also finished all three days, and Lori Oleson rode and completed days one and two on Rosie.

Quicksilver Fall Classic 2015 Update

This is really early to be bringing up the ride for next year, but I wanted to keep everyone updated on what is going on. Our ride manager of the past 2 year, Peggy Davidson, has decided to step down for the upcoming year. She has done a great job and has laid the ground work for the next ride manager to step in and continue her good work. Thank you Peggy for all your time and dedication to the club.

Another change is our date. It has been sanctioned for October 3, 2015. It will be at the same park (Harvey Bear County Park). Lake Sonoma changed their date to October 17th so we needed to have at least two weeks in between the two rides in order for both to have a chance to be successful.

The process of completing the Special Events Permit is in the works, so our date is reserved with County Parks. Many of you may not know, but Quicksilver member Carolyn Tucker is interim Park Use Coordinator with Santa Clara County Parks. I hope her position becomes permanent. This is very well suited to her educational background, and having someone who understands our needs in this position is very helpful.

Trails Update

At our June meeting at Bear Ranch, Pat McAndrews agreed to be our club representative with Santa Clara County Parks as our Trails Committee Chair. In mid-November, Pat met with Elish Ryan, Acting Senior Planner with County Parks regarding trails at Calero. According to Pat the meeting went well and they are very aware of our desires.

There were specific trails at Calero we were concerned about, such as Chisnantuck Peak Trail. This is the beautiful single track trail from the Cottle water trough to the top of the hill. The new trail they have planned is very close to the original trail.

Their goal is to make all trails maintainable and safe for all users. No trails are going to be demolished until new ones are built. They are willing to discuss the issue of what we want at that time.

There will be new trails added with the possibility of 18 different loops. Not all are open to bikes, and there are some exclusive to horses. There is also the possibility of adding a trail around the reservoir if funding comes.

The guy in charge of trail construction is Ranger Paula's husband and Pat said he is a cool guy who wants us happy.

Elish also said that Rancho San Vicente will be ready in 2016, pending okay from County Roads for the appropriate and safe access to the staging area.

Katie Webb Has a New Horse!

Quicksilver member Katie Webb has a new horse of her very own! She has been riding endurance seriously for several years, having started at age 11 on her mare *Jialeah, by riding Swanton Pacific 75 with her mother. For the past three or four years, she has ridden her grandmother's gelding, Jassen's Legacy, very successfully. She has finished every ride she entered except Virginia City 100, when rain and darkness left her without enough time to reach the finish line.

For several months recently, she has searched up and down the west coast for just the right mount and finally found one she really liked—Stevie, a 6-year old Gulastra's Knight daughter, whose registered name is CSF MS Quick Step, Katie purchased her from fellow Quicksilver member Judith Oqus.

Look for them on the trail before long.

Book Review

I manage to read a chapter in the evening before going to sleep. The book is **Unbroken** by Laura Hillenbrand, who also wrote Seabiscuit, from which a movie was made. This is the closest to the subject of horses that it comes.

The story recounts the life of Louis Zamperini, an incorrigible childhood delinquent who broke into houses, became involved in brawls, and fled from his home to ride the rails. As a teenager, he channeled his defiance into running and discovered a prodigious talent that carried him to the Berlin Olympics in 1936 and within sight of the four-minute mile.

During World War II, he became an airman. During one of his missions, his craft crashed into the Pacific Ocean, and he barely made it out of the sinking plane, onto a floundering raft, and a long struggle to stay alive. He encountered sharks, thirst, hunger, and finally—capture by the Japanese.

He spent a long period of time in a prison camp under a particularly cruel captor.

How he survived torture to come home alive and eventually to forgive his captors, is a fascinating story. Zamperini died this past July at the age of 97. Angelina Jolie has directed the forthcoming movie, due out on Christmas Day.


