Ireland.- On my way to the World Equestrian Games I told the travel agent that I wanted to go to the north coast of Ireland. I wanted to be provided a good horse and to be allowed to ride alone.

These parameters landed me at the Stracomer Riding Centre, Bundoran, County Donegal. I could spend only five days so didn't get to join the week long trail rides along the wildly scenic coast. In my teenage years, we moved to San Mateo and were living the mundane suburban life. At this time, Mom and I decided to spend our Saturdays renting horses in Half Moon Bay. Boy, did we get hooked on that. Pretty soon it was all weekend, every weekend Somehow we managed to convince else does a horse need? Thus my first "real" horse, 13 hand fireball named Spunky. By family horse #3, we then convinced Dad (who now realized he'd been taken for a ride) into moving the horses and the family together. One of our horses was a flashy chestnut Arab named Sunny. He was, with him. I remained horse less for the next 7 years.

The Tevis was some kind of race my buddy's girlfriend was doing. She was from Montana. She needed help with "crewing" ("You know", she said, "drive the truck to the finish and relax.") Sounded easy to me. So after 30 hours of endless dust, heat and excited worry, I was hooked on a sport that thrilled every bone in my body. Now, I just had to find a horse, a cheap one, and ride.
