

Pedals vs. saddles for Quicksilver trails

Issue: Commission to decide if equestrian trails will be opened to mountain bikers.

The Santa Clara County Parks and Recreation Commission is considering a plan to open trails in Almaden Quicksilver Park to mountain bikers, ar issue that pits cyclists against

equestrians.
ROMP or Responsible Organization of Mountain Peddlers, began asking for access to some of the park's 30plus miles of steep winding trails about two years ago. The group has about 300 members in the South Bay,

of equestrans is decreasing while the number of cyclists is increasing, and we have more of a chance to preserve

the open space in the county."
"We all have to learn to share," Kain said.

Equestrians who use Quicksilver say it's not a matter of sharing, but a safety issue

"Bikes do run into horses," said Janice Frazier, a trail volunteer and equestran.

While most of the trails at Quicksilver are considered wide enough to according to president Bob Kain.

"Cyclists are the trail stewards of pen space, Kain said. The number winding terrain, which concerns

equestrians like Kitty Monahun.

"If we open up (to cyclists) all the entrances to Quicksilver, it's a disaster asking to happen," said Monahan, who serves on the parks and nextensions. ation commission. She advocates building a separate trail in Quicksilver Park just for cyclists, an option the commission will look at.

But ROMP wants to use existing trails. "We respect that we can't have all the trails, but Quicksilver offers both short and long loops," said Kain. whose group favors a plan drafted by a task force that calls for open use of about 17 miles of Quicksuver purk traiis.

Other options include opening the trails to bikes for a rial period or opening a few trails at a time. Ranger William. Burn feels his staff is pre-

pared to handle enforcement of cycusts and equestrians and has seen shared use work well in other parks.

"I think there are some areas that are bad for bikes, but when you open up an area legally, people are more responsible," Burt said.

Dave Picroe, a county park planner and head of the task force exploring the issue, said his group has studied every trail and has recommended areas for brush removal and aiso spots where speed enforcement is needed.

The commission, which also has tourest the park, will meet on the issue again in December. The board of supervisors also must approve the final plan after a public hearing. A vote is expected next year.



This was another of her greatest achievements, especially since she was on chemotherapy for most of the time. Unfortunately Jane was only able to work on her new job as a Nurse Practitioner for about six months before a relapse.

Jane moved to Morgan Hill in 1976 and had two great kids—Kip, 24 and Curt, 21. She loved her kids more than anything in the world and lived in a beautiful home in Holiday Lake Estates overlooking Lake Anderson.

Jane started riding horses in about 1977 and did her first endurance race in 1985. She also loved Ride and Ties and even completed the Almaden Triathlon Challenge Iron Man in 1992.

One of Jane's greatest loves was horse packing in the Sierra. She loved riding horses, biking and running and had a smile and a big laugh for everyone she met. She was crew chief for four Western States 100 Mile Runs for Dave, Ad, Pat and Mark. All the boys loved her for her spirit and devotion to getting them through to their goal. She was even a crew chief for Mark while on chemotherapy and was tired and weak but determined to help.

Jane loved Cisco, her tall bay Litagator gelding that she raised from a three month old foal. But most of all she loved her kids, family and friends more than anything and felt that having good friends was essential for a happy life. She loved to talk and laugh for hours with people and made all who knew her laugh and love her.

I entered the parking lot at Fatjo and was rather surprised that there was not another car. No ranger, no bikes, no hikers and no horse people. In the old days it would have been like driving up to my favorite surf spot and seeing no one surfing with a perfect 5-6 foot break. So it's horses, I like to ride and it was a great day for it. Getting ready had an excitement to it and, of course, the horse picked up on the mood We set out and with no one else around it was like heading west, well sort-of. It is strange to think that you are the only one enjoying nature in a twenty square mile park that taxpayers are supporting for you. Enjoy, ride out and be part of the experience!



Working our way down a ridge line we came out on a flat area by a dry creek bed. Immediately, two small beady eyes turned from hunting squirrels to focus on us. Mr. Coyote was not happy at the strangers disrupting his work. Slowly he moved away and watched, then the rest of the den moved.

These guys were ganging up on the squirrels. Four of his buddies moved up the hill and waited for us to pass. Natured has a way of taking a break for us city folks to pass by. As went up the trail they went back to work, Breakfast a la squirrel.

Sorka was in a good mood, so we moved out and into an area of dogwood trees. The light of the morning sun, the fresh wash of rain from the day before, left them on my mind



as painting from an impressionist. Beautiful colors and form. Long shadows and glints of sun to light up the leaves on the ground. We spend so little of our time being observers of beauty. Riding has such a reward if you are out there and catch it just right.

On the backside of the park we passed along a narrow trail. Last Spring water flowed in the small creeks but now they only had barren rocks to greet us. It wasn't hot and water was not a concern. The dryness of the scene made it beautiful in another way. Great grey colors, tones of moss brought alive by the rain from the previous day. Everything was clean of the summers dust. Had it been hot I'm sure it would not have had the impact to a visitor of something to enjoy and then move along.

As we followed the trails through ravines and along

side the hills not one sign of others appeared. The rain had cleaned out footprints and such and the quiet of the day highlighted nature. We rounded a turn and looked down on a Nun Lake. A small catch basin to hold water for cattle, not even more



than two or three acres of water. A perfect spot for those feathery friends headed south to take a rest. We disturbed them and, worried about danger, they lifted, fifteen or twenty or so, talking in duck language, a clatter to others, they circled, checked me out and then just as easily splashed down again and paddled for the far shore knowing they were safe from us. It I had brought lunch, this would have



been the place to relax and enjoy it. A grazing horse, clatter of ducks, and no one around to bother me. The five minutes I took to eat a power bar was not enough, but then, when you ride horses, lunch is usually just a power bar.

As I headed back to the trailer the mood of the day changed to one of returning. When you head out you have a feeling of adventure but when you head back you know what lies ahead. Very different ways of looking at the surroundings. It was still the same park with all of the same ani-

mals an tundra. Not another soul had appeared all day and its beauty was not diminished. It was just that I had to return. Two hawks watched form their loft in an old tree, they could care less if I was around. A large buck



ran down the hill away form me. He would be glad to see me go. Acorns should be enjoyed without a stranger intruding. The constant race for the hole by the squirrels ushered us out to the parking lot. (Is that all they do? I can't remember ever not seeing squirrels racing for the hole when I ride by. Maybe that's what they do all day long an we just think they do it only when we ride by). Another great of riding was at an end.


