Trail users to ante up at Wilder

Hikers, horses and mountain bikers will go heel-to-hoof-to-pedal at an upcoming "Poker Ride" in Wilder Ranch State Park.

The fund-raising ride is believed to be the first to combine the three kinds of trail users in a fun and friendly way, according to Chuck Beebe, one of the event organizers.

Appropriately, the ride is at Wilder, one of the first state parks with multi-use trails, Beebe said. It has also been one of the most successful examples of cooperative trail use by equestrians and mountain bikers, who have often been at odds with each other, he said.

The event is being sponsored by the Santa Cruz County Horseman's

Association, Mountain Bikers of Santa Cruz County and the Association of Concerned Trailriders.

The etiquette of the trail for the day will be the same simple method that has worked at Wilder, Beebe said. "Go slow and announce yourself. If everybody's polite you don't have a problem."

Cards collected during the ride will comprise each rider's poker hand. Prizes will be given for the best hands.

Money raised from the ride/hike will be used to build bridges at stream crossings in Gray Whale Ranch, where trails have recently opened.

The ride will be about 12 miles. It will be followed by a barbecue.

The \$12 entrance fee buys a poker hand and meal. Extra hands can be purchased for \$7 each.

More than \$12,000 in donated prizes will be given away and raffled off. Extra points will be given to teams that combine types of trail users, such as a team composed of a hiker. equestrian and bike rider, said Beebe.

The ride will be from 10 a.m. to 4 p.m. on Sunday, April 19. Registration will take place the day of the ride


LOOKING FOR A DRY PLACE TO RIDE?





KIWANIANS AND QSER IN COSTA RICA

My husband, Jess, and I arrived in San Jose, Costa Rica on March 16th, 1998. We made a few call and talked to fellow Kiwanians in Costa Rica. We were not able to meet with anyone that day so we went on to our next destination Tamarindo, which is about 3 !/2 hours from San Jose by car to the northwest coast. It's a good thing we didn't try to drive ourselves because there are very few street or road signs. You know, sort of like Nevada. Tamarindo is a beautiful little town that has not been spoiled by



tourism. We stayed at the wonderful Captain Suzio resort. There were Howler monkey in the tress surrounding our room and Iguanas sunbathed with you during the day. While we were there, we explored the town and found a local doctor, Dr. Hermers Quijada, who was trying to arrange for the training of the local people in first aid and different types of rescue.

He was also trying to find local pilots to fly injured people to San Jose to receive emergency care as the car ride would take too long and there no trained ambulance drivers This doctor donated most of his time to these local people because they were unable to afford care otherwise.

While we were at Tamarindo, we rented some horses for a day ride. We left at 11:30 a.m., which was low tide because we needed to cross a body of water. Jess got a wonderful Paso Fino about 7 years old and I, because I had a lot of experience, got the horse with the scarred up knees, who tripped a lot. Oh well, it was by beautiful countryside and we were really glad we took the ride. Many of the horses and cattle we saw looked very thin even though the pasture looked very green and lush. This could be a great place to retire to on part time basis.


After four wonderfully relaxing days, we head off to Monte Verde. This is a community that was founded by a group of conscientious objectors (Quakers) in 1953. They wanted a place as far away as they could get from war. The community became very self-sufficient. They even have their own cheese factory which supplies cheese for a very wide area. They are in a struggle, one to bring in money to support the people and another to keep the area in a natural state. It is quite high

for Costa Rica, about 10,000 feet above sea level. It is called a "cloud forest".

The next day we were off again to San Jose for a one day lay over. While there, we arranged to meet with several member of the two local Kiwanis Clubs in the San Jose area. We would meet with one fellow, Mario Rimaio, from the Kiwanis Club of San Jose. The Club has been around for 36 years and they meet on Tuesday. Their main interest and projects are scholarships for their young people and a senior citizen home. The Kiwanis Club took over the board of directors because the government

was too undependable with funding for the home. They have been in charge for six years.

After this visit we went back to the hotel in San Jose. The next day we were on our way to Tortuguero, the land of turtles. It



was a bus and boat trip of about five hours to get there. But once again it was worth the effort. On the way there it started to sprinkle. We were asked if we wanted rain gear but it wasn't raining hard so all on the boat said "NO". Boy, was that mistake! It poured and poured. Our guide had to get out of the boat to find the channel for the boat to go down. Since they don't dredge the channel often it gets hard to navigate. The guide asked us what we thought happened in the "RAIN FOREST". I thought it was cold, but my wife, Carla, though it was great. We later went for a walk down the beach and into town. The surf was very strong and there was a large undertow. It was not the beach to swim at, at all, Maybe that's why the Turtles like it so much. The townspeople with little or no help from the government have built a grade school and a teachers house and they are now building a high school so their children can have a better and bright future. This is a town with a population of 450 people. So after a couple of days we were on a flight back to San Jose.

Now that we were back in San Jose for a couple of days, we arranged to meet with the Metropolitan Kiwanis Club of San Jose. We were unable to arrange a meeting with anyone from the Womens Kiwanis of San Jose. They have their own club and are going strong. In some



ways they are even more active than the men's only group. When Costa Rica joined the Kiwanis family they had to fudge on their charter because it was illegal to have separate clubs so they have had women in their clubs for over 35 year. Now the women want their own club and it is going well.


We met with Neal Harmon and Ronald Tucker from the Metropolitan Club. They are the English speaking club made up of mostly Americans but also any other English speaking person who wishes to join. They support an orphanage and some scholarships also. Neither of the clubs support IDD because they didn't feel connected to Kiwanis International since they do not have a district that actually even comes close to meeting their needs. Their district would be over in Nicaragua and Columbia and Panama, much too far to go for an inter club.

There were many wonderful things about Costa Rica, the best of which are the people. They were always smiling even when you weren't in the tourist areas. Many of the things we have are here also which is probably why there are a lot of Americans here to retire. We certainly hope to go again and this time meet with the other two clubs of San Jose, Costa Rica.

QUICKSILVER RIDE & TIE

The Quicksilver Ride & Tie will take place at the Almaden Quicksilver Park in San Jose on Saturday, May 2, beginning at 8:30 a.m. While the event has had multiple names since it was started in the early 1980's, this year's event promises to be as exciting to watch and to participate in as ever. "We expect close to 50 teams from California, Oregon, Nevada, Arizona and even as far as "Virginia" according to Skip Lightfoot, the race director for five years. "This event is special because it is a Pro-Am race so there will be many first time participants." A Pro-Am team consists of an experienced ride & tie participant and a new person to the sport.

Ride & Tie is an endurance sport which combines two runners and a horse on teams who compete on a rugged, cross country course. Courses can vary from 20 to 100 miles in length. The sport's top teams can keep an amazing pace over the difficult terrain. Last year's winning team averaged 5:30 minute miles for 23 miles at Quicksilver. The race start



is probably the most exciting with all the horses and runners sprinting across an open fields as the course narrows down to a trail through the The riders will proceed down the marked course as far as they want, then stop, dismount and tie the horse to a tree or fence. The rider will then start running down the marked course, leaving the horse to rest and wait for the teammate. They switch places on the horse and repeat the same sequence over and over until all three teammates cross the finish line. "The most common mistake new people make in this sport is running past their tied horse." says Skip. "It can get pretty crazy out there with runners and horses all sharing the trail."


Spectators are welcome and there is no charge. The start and finish are at the parking lot off Mockingbird Hill Lane near the junction of McKean and Almaden Roads. The first teams


will finish about 10:30 a.m., with the last teams coming in about 1:30 p.m. Racers can also be viewed at the Tobar parking lot off Almaden Road and the McAbee Road access to the park. The vet check takes place at the McAbee area. Vets thoroughly check the horses at the 11 mile point before they are allowed to continue.the rest of the race. This is a great place for kids and their parents to get close to the horses and watch them being cared for by their crews.

Participants don't have to be ultra-athletes. Several competitors have competed for several years and never run a step. The motto in the sport is "to finish Is to win'", says Skip. "People are always amazed at how far they can go. If you choose the eleven miles course, each person only has to run about 5 miles and you get to rest on the horses every mile or so". The real athletes of the sport are the horses. Most are Arabians, the "Drinkers of the Wind". "Arabians love to run. Sometimes the toughest part of the race is getting them stopped for the tie. They are amazing athletes" exclaims Lightfoot.
